Knipple, violin and piano duet, Master Clark and Miss Myrtle Strevig; vocal duet, Mrs. Harvey Rhodes and Mrs. William Lloyd; two selections, mandolin and piano duet, Dr. Aubrey Lee and Miss Mae Musselman. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. T. S. Land; vice president, Mrs. Jacob Musselman; secretary, Mrs. May E. Gettier; treasurer, Miss Sadie Masenhimer; collection of dues \$23.70; special collection \$9.75, expenses \$7.63, balance, \$2.12 flower fund, total amount collected for evening \$33.45. The society adjourned for a social period; at this time refreshments were served by a committee in charge.


