

FRENCH DEPUTY TO JAIL

WAR HERO, CITED 17 TIMES, BEARING 56 WOUNDS, MEMBER ONLY 48 HOURS.

A Deputy for only 48 hours, "Captain" Verniers will pass the next two years in prison...

That is the kernel of the most dramatic story of the recent French elections. Elected from Lille by 126,000 votes to the Chamber of Deputies, Verniers was convicted of larceny by the military court on December 6, three weeks after he had been elected and two days before the Chamber of Deputies opened its session.

Had his conviction come two days later he would have been immune. Yesterday, seated in a hospital bed, where he had recovered from war wounds, he wrote his resignation.

Before the war Verniers was a valet de chambre in a Lille hotel. When 18 years old he entered the army as a private and became a second lieutenant of artillery and then a full lieutenant.

He was decorated with the Croix de Guerre, the Medaille Militaire and the Legion of Honor.

The military court at Chalons announced that it had sentenced Verniers to two years in prison for having stolen, in 1918, 18,000 francs from the Treasury of his Government, and for having, in 1919, sent two horses and other military property to his father, which were sold for the lieutenant's benefit.

He will begin his prison term as soon as he leaves the hospital, which will be in the near future.


