## SWEET CORN GROWERS HOLD THEIR ANNUAL MEETING

### WERE THE IMPORTANT QUESTIONS DISCUSSED AT THE MEETING.

The Sweet Corn Growers of Carroll County and vicinity held their annual meeting in the Firemen's Hall, this city, last Friday. There was a good representation of the farmers from all the districts of the county and the neighboring counties. A number of new members were taken up. Some old business was dispensed with before the questions were taken up.

A committee was appointed to confer with the Frederick county organization to discuss the formation of a Western Maryland Sweet Corn Growers' Association. The purpose of which is to be the boosting of the growing of sweet corn for canning and improving methods. Each county organization being a unit of the association.

The paying of cash upon the delivery of the last load of corn was very widely discussed from both sides of the question. When the farmer delivers his wheat and other products he is paid cash. Why not for sweet corn? The interest of the money held by the canners for nearly three months will amount to \$10,000. It was decided not to press this point at this time but to take it up at future meeting.

The old officers were reelected. Mr. Geo. Hill, of Hampstead, was appointed director for Woolery's district, left vacant by the death of Mr. Franklin Fenby.

The question of price for this year's crop was discussed from all angles, and it was unanimously decided it would be impossible to grow sweet corn for less than \$25 per ton, at which price the farmer was taking a long chance.

**BEBB BILL PASSED.**  
Kick To Be 3 1/2 Per Cent—No Saloons.  
By a vote of 50 to 37 the House of Delegates inserted in the bill permitting the manufacture and sale of 3 1/2 per cent beer an amendment forbidding the open saloon. This amendment applies to the state at large. The Baltimore delegation, on an amendment offered by Mr. Iverson, asked to be exempted from the state amendment. This meant, if the amendment had been adopted the saloon could be re-established in the city, provided, of course, as has been explained, the Supreme court declares the Prohibition Amendment, or the Volstead Act invalid, the Maryland law then taking the place of the Volstead Act. In violation of every principle of home rule the county members denied the city the privilege to deal with the saloon question. Mr. Iverson's amendment to give Baltimore the right for which it asked was defeated.
