\$15,000,000 BORROWED BY FARMERS.

More than 4,000 farmers were accommodated with loans from the Federal Farm Loan Board's funds during the month of January. Their aggregate borrowings were \$15,000,000. These loans were for periods and at interest rates much below those charged by private lenders. Many thousands of farmers have been directly benefited by this federal loan plan since its inception, and thousands more have reaped an indirect advantage through the reduction in interest rate brought about by this government agency. Like the Federal Reserve System the farm loan act is Democratic legislation and is likely to remain on the books, notwithstanding all the Republican threats to repeal it.


