O. O. F. DEMONSTRATION

PARADE WILL BE HELD IN THE EVENING—500 EXPECTED TO PARADE—BIG CLASS TO BE INITIATED IN ARMY—PLENTY OF MUSIC.

A monster demonstration of the Carroll County Lodges of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, consisting of Salem Lodge No. 60, of Westminster; Sulphur Springs Lodge No. 130, of New Windsor; Daniel and Jacob Lodge No. 25, of Manchester, Springfield Lodge No. 134, of Sykesville; Toney Lodge No. 28, of Taneytown; St. Stephens Lodge No. 58, of Daniel, Prosperity Lodge No. 58, of Mt. Airy, Mason and Dixon Lodge No. 69, of Harney, assisted by Hamden Lodge No. 124, of Hamden, Mt. Zion Lodge No. 87, of Pikesville, Potomac Lodge No. 130, of Hagerstown, Frederick City Lodge No. 100, of Frederick City and Littlestown Lodge, of Littlestown, Pa., will be held Tuesday, May 18, in Westminster.

This promises to be one of the greatest and most enthusiastic demonstrations of its kind ever held in the State and every Odd Fellow should make a special effort to be present and participate in the parade and assist in making this occasion a success. There is expected to be at least one thousand five hundred Odd Fellows in full regalia and on foot in this parade.

The parade will be in three divisions and each division led by a band of music. The first division will form on Main street, on the East side of the Opera House, facing east, and will be led by the Mayor and City Council. This division will be composed of the Mt. Pleasant Band, Grand Lodge officers, Toney Lodge, Hamden Lodge, Mt. Zion Lodge, Potomac Lodge, Frederick City Lodge and Littlestown Lodge.

The second division headed by the Boy Scout Band, of Westminster will form on Main street, on the West side of the Opera House and will be composed of Mt. Airy Lodge, Mason and Dixon Lodge, St. Stephens Lodge and Springfield Lodge.

The third division, led by the Oak Orchard Band, will form on the East side of the Opera House. This division will consist of Sulphur Springs Lodge, Salem Lodge and the candidates who are later to receive their degrees at the Army.

The procession will move promptly at 6:30 o'clock East on Main street to Center, up Center to Green, West on Green to Bond, down Bond to Main, West on Main to Pennsylvania avenue, up Pennsylvania avenue to Union, up Union to East on Main to Longwell, immediately after the parade all Odd Fellows will assemble in the auditorium room of the Army where short addresses will be made by the Grand Lodge officers while the degree teams are getting in readiness.

21 INDICTMENTS FOUND

GRAND JURY ADJOURNED WEDNESDAY—EVIDENCE INSUFFICIENT IN 12 OTHER OFFENSES—MEMBERS OF PETIT JURY AND GRAND JURY—CRIMINAL DOCKET BEGINS MONDAY—THREE TO FACE MURDER CHARGE.

The May Term of the Circuit Court for Carroll County, convened last Monday, with Chief Judge William H. Thomas, on the bench.

The docket contained 49 trials, 4 appeals and 24 original cases. George A. Arnold, of Taneytown, was appointed foreman of the grand jury and J. Thomas Anders and Charles S. Wolbert, clerks.

Levi D. Frizzell, of Franklin District was appointed bailiff to the Grand Jury, Alfred W. Buckingham, of Westminster District, bailiff to the Petit Jury, James J. Horner, of Myers District and George A. McKinney of Middleburg District, bailiffs at the Gates for May Term 1920.

The Grand Jury having been in session three days, examined 64 witnesses, and have found 21 indictments and having disposed of all matters which have come to their attention, they were discharged with thanks by the Court.

To the Honorable, the Judges of the Circuit Court for Carroll County, Maryland:—

The Grand Jurors of your Honorable Court drawn for the May Term, 1920, beg leave respectfully to report:—

That they have been in session for three days and in that time have examined 64 witnesses, and have found 21 presentments and true bills.

As to the three homicides to which special attention was directed in the charge of your Honorable Court to the Grand Jury we beg leave to report that we have returned presentments and true bills against Ernesto Potenziani and Domenico Fabrizio, charging them with the murder of Demonicio Fabrizio, and also a presentment and true bill against Joshua Silas Brothars, alias Nim Brothers, charging him with the murder of Joshua Merryman; as to the third case there does not appear to be evidence sufficient obtainable to warrant a presentment.

In twelve cases which were called to our attention and which were investigated by us we did not consider the matter proper for presentment and they were therefore dismissed.

A few cases came to our attention in which persons doing certain business had neglected to secure a license as required by law, and being satisfied that the persons in question had no intention to violate the law, but that their failure in this respect was merely an oversight, we ask that they be notified by the authorities.

As required by law we visited the County Home and the County Jail. At the County Home we found everything in good condition, and the inmates well cared for and contented under the efficient management of the Steward and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Lambert; one thing came to our attention that we thought proper to offer a recommendation; we learned that the amount allowed for certain farm help on the farm was the same as that allowed some years ago, and less than the increased wages for similar work elsewhere, and we would recommend that the County Commissioners make sufficient allowance for such work so as to correspond with wages paid on surrounding farms. After our inspection of the County Home we were very delightfully entertained with refreshments by the Steward and his family. At the Jail, Sheriff Bloom and his wife have everything in the best of condition, and we can offer nothing but commendation for the way the county's property is being cared for and the prisoners handled; here also we were entertained very delightfully and refreshments abundantly served.

In closing our report we desire to extend our thanks to the Court and list officers for their consideration and help during our investigations.

And now, having disposed of all matters which have come to our attention, we respectfully pray your Honors to be discharged, subject to the further call of your Honorable Court.

GOOD ROADS SUNDAY.

Designated by Committee on Ship by Truck Week.

Washington, D. C., May 14.—Issuing a call for the observance of Good Roads' Sunday, May 16, in connection with National Ship by Truck-Good Roads' Week, May 17-22, the committee in charge of arrangements for the week have addressed a letter to clergymen of every denomination inviting their attention to the "relation between good roads and right living and good roads and Christian progress."

Stressing the point that the early construction of better highways will prove one of the quickest means of facilitating production, the call says:

"The purpose is to fix in the heart of citizens the conviction that the next step to be taken for the welfare of the community, the nation and the world is immediately to improve the highways and to inaugurate measures whereby every mile of roadbed in the United States may be heard surfaced as soon as the combined forces of counties, states, and the Federal Government can secure this result."

The urgent need of increased transportation facilities is emphasized in the call which continues:

"The waterways and railways no longer can handle the volume of traffic that must be moved.

"City dwellers cannot continue to pay the present prices of foodstuffs. A national factor in these excessive costs is the haul from the farm to the town over primitive roads. If production is to be increased, the farmer's life must be made attractive. Nothing will produce this result as surely as modern highways."

REGISTER OF AUTOS AFTER JUNE 1

FINE OF \$5 TO \$1000 IF OWNERS FAIL TO COMPLY WITH NEW LAW.

The recent act of the Legislature requiring all owners of motorcars in the State of Maryland to register title to their cars with the Automobile Commissioner becomes effective June 1. Those who fail to register will be liable to a fine from \$5 to \$1,000 and will be unable to secure a license on January 1 of next year.

A 90-day period of grace, running from June 1, is given for compliance with the law to all those who are in possession of automobiles on that date, with an exception in the case of those who own cars the engine numbers of which have been mutilated or tampered with. Such owners must file application for legal title, with a full history of the car, within 60 days. The man who purchases a car after June 1 with mutilated or altered numbers must make a report and file his application for title within 10 days.

Start Boys in Pig Business.
The Farmers and Mechanics' National Bank offer to the farmer boys a chance to start in the hog business. Arrangements are being made for the purchase of a number of pure bred registered Duroc-Jersey sows pigs.

These pigs will be given to farm boys of their note which will cover the cost of pig and a checking account to cover cost of feed until the sows farrow and the pigs old enough to be sold. The boy then paying off his note.

This system not only gives the boy a good business training in keeping accounts, the handling of money in a business-like way, the acquaintance of business men connected with the bank, and the banking business, but it will give energetic boys a chance to get a good start, help ear some money for a college education or a two year short course at the Maryland State College. Prizes will be awarded to the boys having best reports.

Any boy desiring to take advantage of this offer should give his name at once to the cashier of the bank or to the County Agent.
