HARDING A POLITICIAN OF THE SECOND CLASS.

Upon a platform that has produced general dissatisfaction, the Chicago convention presents a candidate whose nomination will be received with astonishment and dismay by the party whose suffrages he invites. Warren G. Harding is a very respectable Ohio politician of the second class. He has never been a leader of men or a director of politics. For years a protégé of Foraker, he rose to a subordinate office by favor of "Boss" Cox, of Cincinnati. Beaten by Judson Harmon in the contest for the Governorship in 1910, he has never shown independent strength in his own State save when he was named for Senator in 1914, having a majority of a little more than 100,000 over his Democratic competitor; and outside of Ohio he has only such strength as he now derives from his place at the head of the Republican ticket. Senator Harding's record at Washington has been faint and colorless. He was an un distinguished and indistinguishable unit in the rank of Republican Senators who obediently followed Mr. Lodge in the twistings and turnings of that statesman's foray upon the treaty and the covenant.

Governor Colledge for Vice-President really shines by comparison with the head of the ticket. He at least is a man of achievement; he is known to the party and to the nation. When the police force of Boston went on strike he showed himself to be a man. He met that menace to the public safety with courage and determination, and the nation rang with praise of him. It is fortunate that not a word is to be said against the character of either candidate. They are irreproachable. But that does not

compensate for the lack of achievement, for the colorless of the candidate for first place, or for the manner in which his nomination was brought about. It will be felt and said everywhere that the Democrats at San Francisco have received from their opponents at Chicago the gift of a splendid opportunity.—New York Times.

DEPARTMENT HONORS SURVEYOR STEELE.

Adopts Manual He Compiled for Customs Service.

Every paper in Baltimore complimented Surveyor of Port Steele, of this city, on the excellent manual prepared by him. The Baltimore American of June 17, says:

"Just before the breaking out of war Surveyor of the Port Guy W. Steele began work on a manual to be used by the outdoor customs force, the men employed having been obliged to construe the department laws and rules as best they could. This state of affairs was not confined to this city, but obtained at all ports in the country. The war put an end to the Surveyor's work temporarily, and as soon as hostilities ended he resumed his labors.

"Assisted by Chief Deputy Surveyor Hayward and Chief Clerk Wynde, he completed the manual some weeks ago and submitted it to the department. The secretary of the treasury pronounced the little book a most valuable contribution, and promptly indorsed it. Not only this, but he directed that copies be printed and sent to every surveyor in the United States, with instruction to be governed thereby. Under the old system the inspectors and others were given copies of the rules and regulations as promulgated, and on these placed their own construction. As a result there was no uniformity, the laws being enforced in one way at one port and in an entirely different way in others.

"Surveyor Steel's manual interprets all the rules and court decisions, and each carries with it the authority governing his conclusions. It is a complete compendium, and its adoption by the government insures uniformity in enforcement at all ports.

"Wednesday Surveyor Steele received from the Treasury Department a copy of the manual bound in morocco with his name in gilt letters on the cover". Accompanying this was the following complimentary letter:

Hon. Guy W. Steele, Surveyor of Customs, Baltimore, Md.:
"My Dear Mr. Steele—I am pleased to inclose you herewith copy No. 1 of the new "Surveyor's Manual," with your name appropriately lettered thereon and to congratulate you on the completion of the work upon which you have so long and faithfully labored.

In transmitting the initial copy of the manual I further desire to express to you on behalf of the Secretary and of the entire customs personnel, the department's keen appreciation of the valuable compendium

you have contributed and of the great assistance it will be to the outdoor force of the Customs Service in the discharge of their official duties. Indeed, the manual will always remain a monument to the interest and zeal manifested by you in the Customs Service during your administration as surveyor of the port of Baltimore. Sincerely yours,


