

CITY DEMOCRATS AT WORK.

MARYLAND WILL GIVE AN OLD TIME VICTORY FOR COX AND ROOSEVELT

The Democrats are beginning to waken up to the fact that this is a Presidential year, and that Maryland is one of the States whose electoral vote may be necessary to land Governor Cox in the White House next spring.

State headquarters are also showing signs of renewed life. Mr. Al-money the secretary of the State Central Committee is on hand, with his able assistants, John Wagner and Henry Hasencamp, and the force of clerks will be added as the necessities of the campaign demand.

In the meantime, the campaign, so far as the individual candidates are concerned, is going on with much energy. Senator Smith is busy going from place to place, meeting people of all sorts, and making an excellent impression wherever he goes.

He seems to have added greatly to his old-time skill as a campaigner, and is a decided contrast to his Republican opponent, Mr. Weller, who goes around very little, and seems rather to avoid people whom he knows, and shows no desire whatever to meet new people.

He is said to prefer dealing with leaders, and men who control large bunches of voters in person. For a man who has only taken part in politics for a very few years Mr. Weller has more of the characteristics of the old-fashioned, whispering secretive gum-shoe politician, than any prominent man in public life, in Maryland.

Mr. Weller is not a mixer or hand shaker, like his friend protegee Mayor Broening. He is not an orator or debater. He bases his claims for support on the supposition that he is the road builder of Maryland, and asserts, in a flamboyant poster recently sent out, that he is the man who built the good roads of Maryland. It is true he did superintend the construction of some of the state roads, but in doing this he simply carried out the plans made by Colonel Crosby, who had charge of the work during the Democratic administration of the late Governor Crothers.

The entire state road system, was engineered and planned by Major Crosby and Governor Crothers. Mr. Weller had charge of the work for four years, during the Republican administration of Governor Goldsborough, and it is the height of impudence and presumption for him to claim that he built Maryland's good roads and the work done under his supervision was no better done, in some instances not as well done, as that constructed prior to, and since, his term of office.

The truth is Mr. Weller has never really identified himself with Maryland, although he was born in the state. In early life he left the state and all the formative years of his career were passed among the Yankees, and to-day he is in thought, word, and manner a Yankee, and all his views of public affairs, and his way of thinking, are Yankee. He looks at things as a Yankee, and especially at all Maryland matters with the cold blooded, critical eyes of a product of Massachusetts Bay.



In addition to all this purely official work, he attends all sorts of public gatherings of a charitable or social character, looks in at all kinds of meetings held in the interest of the Democratic party, and five nights out of every six is back home at Annapolis with his mother, to whom he is a most devoted son.


