

JOHN WALTER SMITH

Few men have been so greatly honored by the people of Maryland as has been Senator John Walter Smith. None has deserved the honors he has received more justly nor has served the people of his native State more faithfully or more effectively. He has been elected to office many times by his people and has never been defeated in any election where the people had a voice. He won their confidence in the beginning of his career and he has never forfeited it. He has served the people in public offices to which they elected him, nearly thirty years. In that time he has gone through many fierce campaigns but in none of them have any of his political adversaries and opponents been able to point to a single personal, political or official act which savored of wrongdoing or corruption. He has won golden opinions from all sorts of people and has been clear in every office he has held. His defeat in the coming election would be a grievous loss to the people of Maryland regardless of politics. Coming from pious and honorable parentage, Senator Smith was left an orphan at an early age. Upon leaving school, at the age of eighteen years he started business life as a clerk, and at twenty-one he was in business for himself, without inherited wealth or influence made his own way in the world by industry, business sagacity and fair dealing. He devoted himself to his business until his people of Worcester County in 1889 elected him to the State Senate, and so well were his constituents satisfied with him that he was twice re-elected, the whole term for which he was elected being twelve years. But before the end of his third term, to wit, in 1898, when the whole State was going Republican, he was called upon to redeem the 1st Congressional district for his party, having declined the nomination in 1892 when his election would have been almost uncontested. But when his party has been in need of him he has always answered the call and so he made the fight in 1898 and was elected. At this time he was State Senator from Worcester County.

In 1899 when the Democratic Party was in the minority and had suffered two crushing defeats, the Republicans having elected the Governor in 1895 and a majority of the General Assembly in 1896 and again in 1897, Senator Smith was again called upon to redeem the State from the Republican Party. Mr. Smith was unanimously nominated by the Democrats and as was his custom, he accepted the trust. It was a critical time with the party and a hard fight was expected, but Mr. Smith won and was elected Governor by a majority of 12,122 over Governor Lowndes, probably the most popular Republican in the State. WANTS \$1,500,000 FROM CHARLIE

Mildred Harris Chaplin Seeks Film Star Husband's Wealth

The ill-fated marital venture of Mrs. Mildred Harris Chaplin and Charlie Chaplin seems destined for more stormy weather. This time, however, the scene of their troubled affairs has shifted from the motion-picture colonies of the West coast to New York. Mrs. Chaplin has changed her mind. She will not give Charlie a divorce. "Mrs. Chaplin came East a few weeks ago for a vacation," said Mr. Goldsmith, "she told me that Charlie had made a wreck of her life, so that she had to quit work for several weeks. In view of the fact that her husband had abandoned her and fled the jurisdiction of the California court, where she was seeking a divorce, she has decided to let that action drop and will not give Charlie his freedom." "It is true," replied Mr. Goldsmith to a question, "that she has retained me to take care of all her affairs, and I have advised her accordingly. I have told her that under the laws she is entitled to 50 per cent of all of Mr. Chaplin's property, both real and personal, and wherever situated, which came in to his possession from the time of their marriage on October 23, 1918. I am informed that Mr. Chaplin is worth about \$3,000,000, and that part of his property is in the name of his brother Sidney."

Three Dead from Gun Shot

Jackson James, an insanely jealous negro, ran amuck Friday morning, killing a man and woman, wounding another man and was himself shot and killed, in Cumberland.

Raymond Armbruster, circulation manager of the Cumberland Daily News, is in the hospital with a severe wound in the leg above the knee. The negro entered the saloon of George Palmore and killed Martha Green, wife of William Green. James had been paying the woman attention and upon the return of Green, who had been out of town working, she became cold toward James. James drew his pistol in the morning, \$39.80, and purchased a pistol and a box of shells. After killing the woman James rushed into the street, firing right and left. One of the bullets hit Armbruster, who had stopped in the neighborhood on hearing the commotion. As James emptied the revolver he would reload, and as he fired right and left going through the City Hall Square hundreds of men and women who were going to work sought cover. James eventually returned to the saloon and killed Eugene Mallory, colored, a cook at work in the kitchen, without warning.


