

TOO STEADY DIET FAILS TO WIN DIVORCE

Fried Tomatoes and Cucumbers Not a Hardship

Pittsburgh, Oct. 4.—Fried tomatoes and cucumbers may be relished occasionally, but as a steady diet Mrs. William A. Gaskell could not thrive on them, so she brought suit for divorce against her husband, a prominent young man of Carmichael.

Judge Swearingen, in common pleas court, who heard the case decided that Mrs. Gaskell had not made out a case, that the grounds given in her complaint for seeking a divorce were not sufficient for granting a decree.

Mrs. Gaskell charged cruel and barbarous treatment. The couple were married January 16, 1919, and lived together only four weeks in the home of the husband's mother. In her testimony the aggrieved wife declared that the first two weeks with her husband were not so bad, but that the last two weeks were more than she could stand. Her mother-in-law, for some reason, gave her nothing to eat but fried tomatoes and cucumbers. Three times a day the diet was handed out, the young wife declared. Complaints that they palled on her appetite fell on deaf ears. Fried tomatoes and cucumbers bobbed up again at each meal and she was forced to eat them or starve.

She also charged her husband with cruelty, declaring that he had threatened to kill her. Gaskell in his own behalf denied the wife's allegations. He stated that the food served by his mother was well cooked, substantial and in variety. Judge Swearingen, in refusing the decree, stated that fried tomatoes and cucumbers regularly for two weeks was no great hardship.

State May End Auto Agreement With Penna.

Pennsylvania automobile owners stand in a fair way of being put into the same class with District of Columbia motorists in losing the present advantages of the reciprocity licensing arrangement between their State and Maryland. Incidentally Maryland's coffers will be considerably enriched at the expense of the pocketbooks of the Keystone State car owners and operators, according to a Baltimore dispatch.

The change now in contemplation is due to the recent action of the Pennsylvania authorities in arresting road material truck owners who were hauling stone from a short distance over the state line into this state for use on Maryland roads. This, in the opinion of the Maryland authorities, breaks the long-standing non-licensing rule for cars of one line into the other state on temporary pleasure or business trips.

Under the arrangement Pennsylvania was getting the better of it. Many of her farmers and truckers were using, without the regular Maryland license, the reciprocity arrangement to conduct regular business hauls of materials for the Baltimore markets. As the Quaker authorities have broken the agreement and arrested Maryland truck owners, Maryland now plans to retaliate by forcing hundreds of Pennsylvanians who have enjoyed exemption to take out regular Maryland license, the dispatch says.

Former Carroll County Sells Oil Interest, in Missouri

Secretary Maurice B. Gorsuch, of the Shomee Oil and Gas Company, has disposed of his interests in the company of Missouri capitalists. Those concerned in the deal declined to state the exact amount of the consideration, but it is known to have been more than \$40,000. The transaction placed the control of the company entirely in Saint Louis, Genesee, Mo., where a large percentage of the company's stock was already held.

Mr. Gorsuch was one of the incorporators of the Shomee Oil and Gas Company, and has done much to develop this company to its present successful condition. He is one of the many young men who have been successful in the local field, and states that his principal reason for selling out was to enable him to devote his entire time to an Eastern syndicate, which is to place his management in his hands, and which will operate in this and neighboring counties.
