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CARDINAL HOME

MOVED FROM SHRIVER HOMESTEAD MONDAY BY AN AUTOMOBILE—STOOD TRIP WELL—IS IMPROVING.

For the first time since December 12 when he was stricken after a service in St. Joseph's Church, Cardinal Gibbons slept Monday night in his residence where he has lived and worked for many years. He was removed to his home Monday by automobile from the Robert T. Shriver home in Union Mills. Apparently he suffered very slightly from the fatigue of the journey.

The Cardinal's physicians, Dr. Charles O'Donovan and Dr. C. Louis Wetzel, were much pleased at the way in which he withstood the fatigue of the trip. Although advantage had been taken of an unusually favorable turn in his illness to bring him home, the physicians were somewhat uneasy as to the outcome. Due to the extreme weakness induced even in a robust man by a long sojourn in bed, they would not have been surprised if a temporary setback had resulted from the 35-mile trip. Only the ordinary reaction of slight fatigue occurred.

Dr. O'Donovan and Dr. Wetzel believe that the easing of the Cardinal's anxiety to be back in the home atmosphere that has grown dear to him will have a beneficial effect on his health. This desire has been expressed by the prelate several times in the last few days. On one occasion he remarked to one of the priests of his household:

"I want to be back at my Cathedral. I would like to be back again among the priests of my household."

The Cardinal, in a low voice, expressed his joy at the fulfillment of these wishes as he was being carried into his residence.

The trip from Union Mills was started at 10:20 a. m., after a consultation between Dr. O'Donovan and Dr. Wetzel. In the limousine of Mr. Shriver were the Cardinal and two nursing sisters of Bon Secours. In other automobiles were Bishop Corrigan, Bishop Denis J. O'Connell, of Richmond; the Revs. Louis R. Stuckney, Albert E. Smith and Edwin L. Leonard, of the Cardinal's household; Mr. and Mrs. Shriver, Miss Madeline Shriver and Mrs. O'Donovan and Wetzel.

The Cardinal was warmly wrapped in comforts and reclined, virtually in a sitting position, on the rear seat of the limousine. When the automobile reached the Mulberry street gate of the Cathedral grounds, a stretcher, which had been brought from Mercy Hospital, was brought forward.

About 20 pedestrians gathered as the prelate was being carried into his residence. They stood back in respectful silence during the brief journey.

As soon as the Cardinal's presence in the city became known callers began to arrive at his residence. One of the first of these was James R. Wheeler, a friend of the Cardinal of many years. Mr. Wheeler was overjoyed at the Cardinal's return. He made no attempt to see the prelate, however, and advised members of the household to maintain complete peace and quiet.

Two has been preferred by Officer Smith and one by Mr. Shilling. He will be given a hearing this afternoon at the Court House before Justice Walsh.

The others who lost their lives were Dr. Clarence Gibbons and John R. Markley, and his son, Lawrence Markley. Gibbons was president of the Law and Order Society of Philadelphia, and several times candidate for the offices of mayor, district attorney and sheriff. He was counsel for Grover C. Herdroll, the convicted draft dodger and fugitive from justice. Markley was promoter and director general of the defunct International Lumber and Development Company, who was convicted in 1914 of using the mails to defraud. Mr. Shriver was a son of the late Francis Shriver and brother of Edwin W. Shriver, this city. His mother was a sister of the late Joshua Yingling. He attended the public schools of the city and was a student at Western Maryland College. He went to Philadelphia many years ago, and there married as his first wife, a Miss Griggs. He for a number of years held important business positions with the Griggs Carriage Works and other prominent enterprises of Philadelphia, and was president of the International Company. He was about 6 years of age. His father was for a long time secretary of the Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Carroll County.

They are also provided a noon meal of soup, bread and fruit. In the same building there is conducted an Americanization school for women, and an Educational Club for boys, all under the management of the Women's Christian Temperance Union. Mrs. Shipley reported the needs of the kindergarten school at this time, crayons, pencils, tablets, picture books and handkerchiefs.

Mrs. Philena Feunty, was present and discussed plans and probable expenses for entertaining the State Convention in Westminster, October, 1921. The next meeting of the Union will be the last Thursday in January, at the home of Mrs. John Bowers.
