

EDUCATIONAL MEETING

pl achievement may be secured at a much lower per capita expenditure than in states that are less efficiently organized, but no matter how efficiently the schools are organized, supervised, and taught, the children who are not in school regularly are not receiving the benefit, and Maryland ranks forty-fourth among the forty-eight states in percentage of children of school age attending school. With all due allowance for local conditions, of which we are well aware, and with full recognition of the splendid efforts that have been made since 1916, the school attendance problem is still unsolved in Maryland.

His address was followed by a most entertaining discussion of "The education of the child and the adaptation of the educational curricula to the vocations of life," by Thomas H. Briggs, professor of Secondary Education, Teachers' College, Columbia University. The fact was that his proper education for the child is to teach him to do well those desirable things that as an adult he will do at any rate, and incidentally made a comparison between the amount of money spent for armament and the amount spent for education in America.

Something not on the program was now introduced. In order to show their appreciation of the valuable and loyal services of Miss I. J. Simpson, as Supervisor for the past four and half years in Carroll County, the teachers presented her with a beautiful seed pearl necklace with a platinum clasp studded with diamonds. Miss Simpson was taken completely with surprise by responding very appropriately in accepting the present.

At the special meeting of the teachers at 4.30 for the purpose of organization, Geo. F. Morelock was elected Chairman of the Association; Emory C. Fougus, Vice-President; Kellner Smith, Secretary; Margaret Lockard, Treasurer, and Mr. Ebaugh was appointed delegate to the meeting of the National Educational Association to be held in February.

In the evening session, Dr. H. M. Fitzhugh, President of the State Board of Education, Chairman, the principal feature was the address of Dr. George Drayton Strayer, Prof. of Educational Administration, Teachers College, Columbia University, on "The Meaning and Tendencies of Modern Education" in which he emphasized discoveries made in the war as to the character and quantity of education that the people of the U. S. seemed to have and how far below the standard of what is deemed an average education the American people have fallen.

He also stressed the desirability and necessity in view of American social progress that the rural child should have the same opportunity for education as the urban child.

After the evening session an informal reception was given to the teachers, speakers, and their guests in the College Library by Dr. and Mrs. Ward after which refreshments were served.

To Preserve Game
Four of the seven counties invited to join what is known as the Western Maryland Federation of Fish and Game Associations have accepted. They are Washington, Carroll, Frederick and Howard counties. Three counties yet to commit themselves are Montgomery, Allegany and Garrett.

It was James C. Rowe, president of Frederick County Fish and Game Association, who conceived the idea of amalgamating the fish and game associations of this section. His purpose is to interest the counties of Western Maryland as a whole in the preservation of game and wild life, and to assist the State Conservation Commission in the enforcement of laws drafted for the preservation of game.
