Bride Ends Life in Hospital.

New York, Jan. 21.—While a nurse was temporarily absent from her room in the New York hospital, Mrs. Dagmar Bexelius, beautiful bride of a Swedish banker, committed suicide by leaping from a window to the street, five floors below.

Egg Farm Owner Tarrred For Going To Negro Wedding

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 26.—Francis Patrick Sullivan, who operates a chicken farm near here and who was tarrred and feathered here last night by five men told the police today, according to them, that he assumed he was attacked because he had attended a negro wedding and had been asked to be godfather at negro christening. Municipal authorities are investigating the attack but no arrests have been made. Sullivan was born in Australia, but is an American citizen and a veteran of the world's war.

Bandits Rob County Treasurer of \$14,000 After Felling Him

Marion, O., Jan. 26.—Two bandits entered the office of the county treasurer in the courthouse here today, knocked Treasurer Ferry unconscious with the butt end of a revolver and escaped in an auto with \$14,000 in cash.

The vault contained between \$50,000 and \$75,000 in tax money which the robbers did not get because of Treasurer Ferry's foresight in locking the safe after taking out the money to be used as change in the day's business.

Reduces Bread: Gets Brick

Chicago, Jan. 28.—Every time they hurl a brick through my windows I will cut the price of bread one cent a loaf until it is back to a nickel for a big loaf.

This was the defiance issued today by Benjamin Schachter, who operates a large bakery. Three men in an automobile running without license, plastic or lights, dashed past his bakery last night and threw a cobblestone through one of his large display windows.

It was the Jewish Master Bakers' Association," he said. "They threatened me when I first reduced the price to 9 cents. I can sell bread at 9 cents and make a good profit. I'll let no gang dictate to me, and just because they broke my window the price of bread will be 8 cents. Every time they break my windows or commit similar devilry, I will cut one cent off the price.

Europe Will Owe U. S. 20 Billions

Washington, Jan. 25.—Europe's debt to the United States will be increased to \$20,000,000,000 by 1921, George E. Warren, professor of economics at Cornell University, so declared at tariff revision hearings by the house ways and means committee. This sum, he said, will include the \$10,000,000,000 war time borrowings from the American treasury.

Mr. Warren estimated European business now owned American goods nearly \$4,000,000,000. He said Europe must send her products to this country in payment of import duties. He especially urged tariffs on farm products which he said could be turned out cheaper overseas than here.

Giving his opinion the rate of exchange would not improve for some time, Warren said the rate would tend to increase the European debt. The danger in the situation, he said, was the costliness of debt might result in dumping their commodities in the United States markets regardless of price.

Feeding the Guests of One Hotel

The Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, N. Y. City, in order to serve 316 patron requests in a single year 275,000 lbs. of butter, 500,000 qts. of milk, 90,000 qts. of cream, 2,169,000 eggs. A combination of three large New York Hotels uses \$1,000,000 worth of meat, \$270,000 worth of fish, 150,000 lbs. of coffee, and 1,250,000 lbs. of sugar. Another large hotel in N. Y. City maintains a silver service of 130,000 pieces. The stationery department in one year uses 65,000 lead pencils and about 100,000 lbs. of stationery. Its laundry in one year has handled 14,000,000 pieces of work.
