A dozen cables are on my desk from various centers in Armenia, Anatolia, Cilicia and Syria pleading pitifully for the lives of hundreds of thousands who are homeless.

Refugees flocking into Aleppo? Twenty thousand refugees at Ismid? One hundred thousand people at Alexandropol will starve unless relief is provided.

Can we really enjoy our wealth and claim the name of Christian if we turn a deaf ear to the appeal which General Leonard Wood, in behalf of the Near East Relief, has sent forth broadcast for a Lenten Sacrifice offering to save these little children in Bible Lands?
