

YOUNG WOMEN'S BOARDING HOMES

Chain of 29 Social Welfare Stations Provide Home Comforts for Employed Girls.

The Salvation Army has established a chain of 29 boarding homes through the country to provide the girls employed in mills, factories and department stores with good wholesome living conditions at small cost.

There are a great number of young women who are deprived of these pleasures for many causes. Eminent respectability and self-supporting though they are, the average earnings in the positions which they occupy are not sufficient to meet their needs if the ordinary methods of living are followed.

With this need before them The Salvation Army met the problem by setting up comfortable and attractive boarding homes in the larger cities that have the home atmosphere infused and maintained through the presence and supervision of the Salvation Army Matron, who is also a trained nurse and always the kind, loving friend to whom the girls may go with any problem at any time.

The facilities for music and reading, the privilege of taking care of their own clothes in the laundry and the use of the electric iron to do their pressing, a sewing machine to facilitate their dressmaking and an attractive place where they may receive their young men and women friends, all combine to make these homes popular and keep them filled to the limit of their capacity.

These are entirely self supporting, though the charge to the girls is far below what they would be required to pay in the average city boarding house.

The very splendid cheery Christian Home in Chicago accommodated 149 girls, at a charge of from \$2.50 upward per week for steam heated, outside rooms, with hot and cold water, electric light, use of parlor, laundry and electrical irons and three good meals a day. These prices are about the same in all of the 29 other homes in the United States.

These establishments are simply furnished with an eye to practical comfort rather than showiness and the snowy linens, shining floors and wholesome meals together with the good cheer and safety with which the girls are surrounded, has made for them all a long list of waiting applicants.

In the cheeriest sun parlor of one of these a brilliant literary woman, now hopelessly crippled through a railway accident, is passing serene and happy days, the pet of the household. Her paper looks out for her monthly rental and she is lavishing all of the love of a lone, friendless shut-in upon the matron and the girls of the Home who brighten her dreary life all they can.

MAKING BAD MEN GOOD

Effective Revolutionary Method Use by the Salvation Army in Prison Work.

During the last year The Salvation Army has found employment and given financial aid to 2,300 discharged prisoners. The old story of the man who cannot find a job because he has "done time" is a thing of the past. For The Salvation Army is always willing to find him employment. The old tale of the convict who is driven back to crime through poverty and friendlessness is out of date, for The Salvation Army is daily applying its theories of practical Christianity to the prison problem.

In 383 prisons and reformatories during the last year, 8,000 religious meetings were held under the auspices of the Salvation Army. They were attended by more than 260,000 prisoners and more than 9,500 men and women declared their intention of becoming self-respecting and useful members of society.

Nor does The Salvation Army confine its prison activities to convicts and ex-convicts. The entire family is frequently cared for and protected by The Salvation Army. Food is provided where there is want, shelter is given to the homeless, and a spirit of forgiveness is instilled in order that the family may be ready to welcome the transgressor on the day of his release.

In connection with the work of The Salvation Army, both inside and outside of the prison gates, some of the most remarkable stories might be told. Among the conversions made during the last year are some of the most notorious criminals in the United States—men who were old-timers hardened offenders who had spent the major portion of their adult years behind bars. And in almost every instance the conversion has been sincere. Out of the scores placed on parole to The Salvation Army from every State and every county during the last year, only eight per cent. of the entire number failed to make good, the remaining ninety-two per cent. report regularly to The Salvation Army once each month and are quickly becoming hard-working, self-respecting men and women.

Among the recent activities of the Prison Department of The Salvation Army is the Life's Club, an organization composed exclusively of the 152 men who are serving life terms in the penal institutions of this country. The purpose of the club is to give the lifer something to occupy his mind—something to keep him in contact with fellow prisoners in other institutions and with the outside world. The officers of the organization are lifers, the members are lifers, and it will not be long before a magazine, edited by lifers, will be circulated by The Salvation Army through every prison in the United States, as a message of cheer for the present and hope for the future.

For the suffering womanhood of the world the Salvation Army has established a chain of Maternity Hospitals, where the girls, betrayed, deserted, without money, home and friends, may find a refuge and medical attention. While here, every effort is put forth toward their regeneration—the first step in which is the future care of their babies. When physically fit to go out, they are sent out to situations with their babies, which they are urged to keep and support, or they are sent back to their parents and friends.

During the past year 7163 were received into these homes of whom 4493, or 90 per cent., returned to self-sustaining lives of respectability.

Another feature of the Maternity Hospital is that section set apart for the respectable woman of moderate circumstances who may here obtain a room and the attention and nursing during her confinement at a low charge, that she could not possibly afford in the regular hospitals.

The Salvation Army has also created a little club in each Rescue Home and Maternity Hospital by means of which it is able to keep in touch with the girls who have found a haven in these hospitals in their time of great trouble. This is called the "Out-of-Love Circle" and its members are the girls whose little nameless babies first saw light of day in a Salvation Army Maternity Hospital.

They meet once a month in each of the 23 cities in this country in which there is located a Salvation Army Rescue Home for women.

All employed in positions, most of which the Army has secured for them, and all making good; they come back to their meetings out of love, they feel for what was done for them, and this try to show it by helping the inmates of the homes toward getting new hope for the future.

This is one of the reasons why more than 85 per cent. of all the women and girls who are graduates of the Salvation Army's 26 institutions for erring girls are now supporting themselves and their children.

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THE GIRL ON THE JOB

How to Succeed—How to Get Ahead—How to Make Good

DOMESTIC SERVICE

DOMESTIC service is getting to be so well paid that women who a short time ago would have scorned it as utterly beneath them are beginning to look toward it with a growing affection. Domestic science is being taught in most communities, and the graduates increase every year. Most of these girls, after their training in institutional and hotel work, into teaching, into hospital service, set up tea and lunch shops, and follow allied lines. But positions like these are not always immediately available. Put domestic cooking in the same class, and many a girl could earn a good salary and live comfortably until she found some more advanced work.

One way in which this will be brought about is in the growing use of cooks and house workers generally by the hour instead of the month. Such workers get more salary, but no lodging, and only the meal or meals they serve. But such workers are paving the way for the proper recognition of domestic work as a dignified and important profession, one for which adequate training is essential, and which has the right to claim respect and consideration.

There is a big future in domestic work. With the tremendous advance in electrical machinery for the home the actual work is growing to be both easy and agreeable. It is high time that the social stigma should disappear, and the advance in salaries is going to help largely to accomplish this result.


