Out of Love Clubs

More than 30,000 young girls and women comprise this membership. They have one strong tie in common. They have all been, at one time, inmates of a Salvation Army Rescue Home for unfortunate women, and when their "little nameless" babies first saw light of day it was in a Salvation Army Hospital.

They meet once a month in each of the twenty-six cities in the country in which there is located a Salvation Army Home of this kind.

They discuss their problems, their work plans for the future, and their appreciation of the organization that cared for them when friendless.

Those girls are all filling positions secured for them by the Salvation Army and making good.

For three years they are expected to report regularly, either in person or by letter. At the end of that probationary period they are strong enough to keep permanently respectable.

They come back from time to time to these "fish" meetings to help the girls still inmates of the institution, by cheering and encouraging them for the future.

Their attendance, and the little donation they bring is made out of love for what has been done for them.

This is the system by which the Salvation Army keeps in touch with the girls who have passed out of its Rescue Homes and it is the reason why more than 85 per cent of all the women who have gone through the same Rescue Homes are now supporting themselves and their children and leading respectable lives.

Last year in the twelve Rescue Homes and maternity hospitals conducted by the Salvation Army in the eastern section of the United States 725 nameless babies were born. Their future and that of their mothers is the program upon which the Salvation Army is working. Most of these Rescue Homes are modern fire-proof, efficiently equipped structures, constructed with a view to giving the most comprehensive service to suffering womanhood. They are intended primarily for the treatment of unmarried mothers. In them, her story is confidential and every effort is put forth to draw her to the faith of her Father and to impart in her a permanent love for her child and for a life of respectability.

The girls are all required to remain in the home for three months after the baby is born, thus giving the mother the opportunity to learn to properly take care of her child and also to learn to love it.

The ages of the girls range from thirteen to twenty-three years and the majority of them come from small towns, and the country districts.

A notable fact presented by various Salvation Army Officers in charge of these homes is a contradiction of the popular theory that most of these girls are incorrigible. Many times these girls go back to their families and, quite often, find happiness in marriage.

Tire Breaks Girl's Legs

An unusual accident early Monday evening broke both legs of Geffredo Moyer, eight years old, of Philadelphia. Sent to the store by her mother, she stood on the sidewalk to let pass an automobile coming up the street at a rapid rate.

As the automobile opposite her front tire, nearest her flew off, struck her above the feet and broke a bone in each leg. She was taken to St. Agnes' Hospital. The driver was locked up in the station house.

ANTI-DRY FIGHT IS ON IN

FARNEST

Hill Expects To Succeed; Volstead Takes Up Challenge

Washington, April 15.—The battle to bring back beer and other wine will be fought to a finish in this Congress, it was declared by both "wets" and "drys" today. The fight will come to a head in the House as soon as the tariff and taxation program can be cleared away.

Preparatory preparations for the clash were commenced today by the "drys" whose ranks were bolstered by a new member from Maryland, Representative John Philip Hill of Baltimore, who unexpectedly tossed in a bill to repeal the Volstead act.

Representative Volstead accepted Hill's challenge. He is chairman of the Judiciary Committee that will report on the repeal bill. He made it clear that while hearings will be held and fair, every effort will be made by him to "throttle" the "house bill."

Incidentally, the new congressman may ruin his own business if he succeeds in legalizing beer and light wine. He owns a drinking water company in Baltimore.

"I want to repeal the Volstead law principally because it is an utterly un-American principle of government," he said.

Hill believes he will succeed for two reasons: "First—My bill, if passed, will not bring back the saloon, but would allow each State to have beer and light wine if the people so voted.

"Second—The prohibitionists themselves never thought prohibition would go to the extreme it has. They never would have voted for it if they had known how far it would reach. Most of them are ready now to get away from the drastic limits of the present."

112 LEPERS CURED


Scenes of Rejoicing as Men and Women End Exile in Hawaii.

Honolulu, T. H.—The simple grandeur the notes and words of an American hymn arose from 500 throats; a stalwart, white-headed Hawaiian senator and pastor spoke a solemn benediction, and sixty-four men and women—once lepers, fled hitherto the lava pillars of Kalahe's gates to freedom, back to a world from which they had been outcast, back to the homes which some at least believed they never would see again.

Science had won another great battle with the scourge of the ages.

The sixty-four patients who were released on parole the other day from the Kalahe Hospital after treatment with refined chaulmoogra oil, constituted the third division so returned to their homes. In all 142 have been paroled during the last two years and not a single one has been sent back owing to the recurrence of the disease.

Officially the institution is known as Kalahe Hospital, but its inmates call it by another name, a strange name, unless one has seen the cheerfulness born of hope that prevails the air there. It is "Mount Happy." On the day sixty-four were paroled friends and relatives gathered from far and near in the islands to greet those who came out of the vale of shadow. Behind a hedge stood one group of smiling inmates, behind a group of smiling another happy group.
