Mrs. Harvey M. Ruth, Hanover, and Aaron Ruppert, of Dover, were killed and five others were injured Sunday afternoon when an automobile driven and owned by Ruppert ploughed over a 60-foot bank into the Susquehanna river at the McCall's Ferry dam.

Maryland's apple crop is expected to be the smallest in the last 20 years according to an official statement issued by Dr. S. B. Shaw, specialist in horticulture for the University of Maryland - Extension Service. The shortage, he said, was directly due to the killing effects of the early spring freeze.

Determined to rid downtown street corners in Baltimore, of young men who loiter about with seemingly nothing to do but cast admiring glances at women who are wearing "em high," police of the Central district Monday "raided" the northeast corner of Lexington and Charles streets and gathered in seven youths, a majority with their hair neatly parted in the middle.

After her skull had been fractured by her assailant, 7-year-old Margaret Loney, daughter of William Loney, was criminally assaulted yesterday in the cellar of her home, 918 East Pratt street, Baltimore. Three men held at the Eastern Police Station on the charge of being drunk. They were arrested soon after the assault had been discovered, but the police doubt whether they are the men wanted.

Private Charles A. Hoffman, 22 years old, of Camp Holabird, holder of the middleweight boxing championship of the Third Corps Area, United States Army, and Mrs. Margaret V. Hoffman, 29 years old, his bride of a few days, were shot down Monday night as they sat at a table in the dancing pavilion at River View Park by Private Ralph Frucci, 22 years old, also of Camp Holabird. Frucci declared that Mrs. Hoffman had married him in Virginia 18 months ago.

Two young men, Brown and Lockard, this city, were arrested Saturday night for disturbing the peace. Captain Weigle was taken unaware and was checked by Brown and Officer Mitten was bowled over in 13th street before the pair could be subdued. Both were landed in jail but were released on bail Sunday. The young men attracted about 1000 people who seemed to enjoy the scrap. Both will have a hearing before Justice Walsh on several charges preferred.
