CONVICTED MURDERER STARVES HIMSELF IN MOUNDSVILLE CELL

Moundsville, W. Va., July 5.—Convicted of robbery and murder and sentenced to serve a life term in the State penitentiary here, Tony Gradiscen died a hunger striker in the prison hospital today. Gradiscen, according to penitentiary officials, refused to eat June 29, the date of his arrival here, and never swallowed anything afterward. Food was forcibly administered but the prisoner continued to become weaker.

TWO WOMEN SAVED AT BRINK OF DEATH AT NIAGARA FALLS

Niagara Falls, July 5.—One woman was overcome with heat today and tumbled into the Niagara River a short distance above the American falls, and another, fainting from excitement, followed her. Both were rescued. The first woman, Mrs. Joseph

Raines, of this city, was seated in the State reservation, on a ledge near the water's edge, with a woman companion. Persons resting near the Goat Island bridge saw Mrs. Raines and then the other woman slip into the river and sounded the alarm.

Several men responded and fished Mrs. Raines' companion out of the water before going after her. Meanwhile, Mrs. Raines had been carried 15 feet from shore and was being borne along toward the falls when a man, who later refused to give his name, seized a rope and waded out after her.

Edward Hager, of Wrightsville, N. J., had obtained the rope from his automobile. The unidentified hero, taking one end, ran along the shore, passing the woman as she was being carried down stream.

He moved out directly from shore, with the other end of the rope held by George Healey, of this city. Then he seized the woman when she reached him and towed her to shore.

BALD HEAD SAVES OWNER.

Fairmont, W. Va., July 5.—A bald head has proved an advantage to a man, for it saved the life of Joe Larossa, of this city. Larossa was arrested on a charge of murder, accused of being one of the men who killed Rocco Verdignone on the night of May 29, on Lee's Run road, I. C. Straight was the only witness introduced for the State when Larossa was arraigned before Magistrate Billinglee for a preliminary hearing. Called to identify Larossa, he balked absolutely when he was confronted with the latter's bald head.

Straight was willing to testify that the prisoner wore the same kind of clothes, looked like the same in the face and was the same size as the man he saw in the murder car, but he declared the alleged murderer had long black curly hair. Larossa's pate is almost denuded of hair and the witness said that by no stretch of imagination could he be the man he had seen. Larossa was discharged by Magistrate Billinglee, who declared that it probably was the first time in the history of West Virginia that a man had cause to be thankful for having a bald head.

POST CARD 13 YEARS ON ITS WAY.

York, Pa., July 5.—For 13 years a post card, received today by Dr. H. E. Lau, of this city, had been en route from Eaglesmere, ordinarily a short day's journey. The card, which was mailed by Jesse Gardner, then a college mate of Dr. Lau, bears the postmark of July 20, 1908.
