#### COURT WILL SAY IF WAIST IS IMMODEST

ZION CITY GIRL WILL APPEAL HER CASE TO HIGHEST COURT

Zion City, Ill., July 13.—The courts are going to hear more about Mrs. Sarah Johnson's alleged peek-a-boo waist.

A jury of 12 men decided that Mrs. Johnson, who is 19 and comely, was bedecked in a waist that left too little to the imagination. The court fined Mrs. Johnson \$5 and costs, claiming that Wilbur Glenn Voliva's mandates regarding modesty in women's dress had been violated.

Mrs. Johnson contends that the waist she wore when Chief of Police Decker of Zion City accumulated the eyeful of evidence that he told about in court revealed nothing below the collarbone. The chief testified that he viewed "marched" waist.

Attorneys for Mrs. Johnson are preparing to seek the opinion of a higher tribunal.

#### KILLED UNDER TRUCK

One of the most distressing accidents that has happened on the highways in this neighborhood, occurred on the North Branch hill, on Tuesday afternoon, July 6. A large truck, manned by a driver and two helpers, was on the way from Baltimore laden with several tons of goods belonging to the A. & P. Tea Company, for distribution to various stores. In making the sharp curve at the top of the hill, the driver evidently lost control of the machine as it struck a tree at the side of the road and overturned. The driver was caught under the machine and a derick had to be obtained before he could be released. He was still alive, but died on the way to the hospital. The other two men were critically hurt and were removed to a hospital. All the injured men were from Baltimore.

Remember you can be just as much help to the University as it can be to you if you are a live wide-awake woman who sees her responsibility and opportunity. Will you not talk it over with your neighbors? We are anxious for your assistance. So come to the meeting Friday with suggestions.

## \$45,000 LAW SUIT

### CHARLES E. FINK ESTATE RECEIVES VERDICT IN LAND CASE AGAINST DR. SHERMAN AND OTHERS.

The three suits of Dr. Jacob H. Sherman and wife, Mrs. Mary D. Barker and Mr. Roy H. Singer and wife against the estate of the late Charles E. Fink, Esq., involving over \$45,000, and growing out of land purchased near Yakima, in the State of Washington, were tried at a special session of the Court beginning on Wednesday and ending on Thursday night, of this week. Chief Judge William H. Thomas and Associate Judges Robert Moss and William H. Forgyrie, Jr., heard these cases along with a fourth case of Dr. Sherman against Mr. J. Brooke Fink. The four cases were all tried together and resulted in a verdict in every case in favor of the estate of Mr. Charles E. Fink and of Mr. J. Brooke Fink.

The plaintiffs in each case were represented by Guy W. Steele, Esq., and the defendants by Bond & Parke.
