Mrs. Mattie Kirby, prominent State temperance worker, of Adrian, Mich., was charged with the murder of a child born July 4 to her unmarried daughter, who was bound over Tuesday for trial at the October term of Circuit Court, following examination in Justice Court. Her bail was fixed at \$5000.

John E. Gehr, 67, dependent and in ill health for some time, committed suicide early Sunday morning at his home in Indian Springs by shooting a load from a shotgun through his heart. His wife hearing the report of the gun downstairs, leaped out of the bed and hurrying below found her husband dying.

Sheriff Seth learned that Alfred Vaughn, a negro prisoner in the Elkton jail, took part in robbing Charles D. Sneed, a civil war veteran, of Philadelphia, of \$1600, while the latter was temporarily detained because of his mental condition. After stoutly denying knowledge of the crime, Vaughn finally confessed and turned over about \$400 of the loot.

Secret Service officials are bending every effort to locate what may prove to be the most efficient band of counterfeiters that has ever operated in the United States. It was learned, however, a counterfeit \$20 Federal Reserve note, said by bankers to be the best piece of workmanship of this kind ever seen was shown to Washington tellers by a representative of the Treasury department.

Williams S. Beiswanger, Postmaster at Highfield, has been arrested by United States postal authorities. The charge against Mr. Beiswanger is appropriating to his own use funds of the United States government. He is now under \$1000 bail for a hearing before United States Commissioner Alexander R. Hagner at Hagerstown. The charge states that while acting as postmaster at Highfield Beiswanger failed to make returns to the postal authorities of money received on money orders and gives the amount as \$351.50.
