

TIMONIUM POULTRY EXHIBIT.

Anyone interested in poultry will do well to visit the poultry department at the Timonium Fair this year which will be filled to overflowing.

There will be large classes in all the popular varieties such as White Wyandottes, Rhode Island Reds, Leghorns, Plymouth Rocks, and Cornish, as well as the rarer varieties of Game and Ornamental Bantams. There will also be displays of all kinds of geese, ducks and turkeys.

The competition will be keen and local fanciers are looking forward to the show as a try out for their birds, in preparation for the Great Show to be held in Baltimore, December 6th to 10th, 1921.

The display of Bantams will be large and of many kinds, and will be equal to the display of the popular midgets at many of the larger shows. This year the Timonium Fair co-operating with Mr. E. G. Jenkins, Agt. for the State Boys Club, sent out a large number of settings of eggs to boys and girls throughout the State.

These boys and girls will show a trio of birds which they raised from these eggs. There will be prizes for the boys and girls who have raised the best chickens. There will be fifty or more exhibitors in these juvenile classes.

The Poultry Show will open on Tuesday morning and close on Friday at noon, as it is not advisable to keep chickens, ducks turkeys and geese cooped up too long.
