"Fatty" Arbuckle, the movie actor, who was convicted for the murder of Miss Rappe, had 40 quarts of liquor at his party in San Francisco.

William Hohlitzel, state game warden of New Jersey, was found dead in a woods, having been killed by law offenders.

Cornelius Crumrine of Hanover, Pa., sold his farm near Melrose to Cyrus Leese, of near that place. The price paid was \$10,500.

Edward Houston, a small colored boy of Chestertown, died from lockjaw, resulting from a blank cartridge pistol wound.

Mrs. Dora Vaughn, of near Covington, was arrested, charged with violating the local option law, and held for a hearing.

The Postoffice Department has notified the postmaster at Denton that on October 1 free carrier service will be inaugurated.
