WHY OUR MONEY IS WASTED

The account appearing elsewhere in this issue, of the defeat of the budget bill at Annapolis, by the Republican County Commissioners, throws light on many things we did not understand at the time, and it is astounding to know that public officials would defeat a bill, because, if they save funds around the people's money. How could the County Commissioners object to a bill which prevented them from showing favoritism, from obeying the dictates of a selfish organization for the benefit of some fortunate individuals, that would not allow them to spend the taxpayers money, unless they first told the people about it, and gave them an opportunity to protest?

The deplorable fiscal condition of the County is apparent to all; any one who pays taxes knows that the burden he has to bear is severe, and the County Commissioners ought to explain how it is that they can spend over \$120,000.00 for macadam roads for which they apparently have no direct legal authority; how they can brazenly pay out the peoples money contrary to law? During the war the Democrat party ran the county with a tax rate of eighty-eight cents, and when the new assessment with the large increased taxable basis came in 1917, they reduced the tax rate to eighty-two cents. Mr. Dayhoff was then President of the Board, and the report of 1918, under the levy shows that on June 30th, there was a balance in bank to the credit of the county, and the County was out of debt, and this on an eighty-two cent tax rate which was levied and the year's expenditures mapped out before Mr. Dayhoff retired in December, 1917.

The levy of 1918, was made by a Board of County Commissioners in control of the Republicans. Mr. Rupp then being a member, and he and Mr. Stansbury promptly raised the tax from eighty-two cents to a \$1.23; and this is the same Mr. Rupp who made his campaign on lower taxes. Today, our taxes have gone up to \$1.40, and the county owes over \$300,000.00 on June 30th, as shown by the report of the auditor, which does not include the amounts due incorporated towns for their share of taxes. In other words while the taxes of other coun-

ties and states since the war have gone down, under Republican mismanagement ours has gone up and the county in debt.

It is strange how history repeats itself; during the civil war the Republicans were in control of the fiscal affairs of the County and they also mis-managed them so that they ran us into debt, with the result that the people of the county arose and rebelled and put the Democrats in power. This debt was then funded, and it took years to pay it off, and never during that generation was a Republican elected on the Board of County Commissioners of Carroll County.

But that generation passed away, and the present generation not knowing of their father's experience hearkened to the cry of Mr. Stansbury that there should be a minority representation on the Board and elected him. Like their fathers, they also during the late war, turned over our county to the Republicans with the same result their fathers had, mismanagement, and indifference to the people's interest, which has caused our present condition and shows plainly that though Republicans can be elected to many offices which they will fill creditably to themselves and to the satisfaction of the people, yet, when it comes to managing the fiscal affairs of the County they always fall down. Why this is we know not, but we do know that under Democratic management Carroll County was the lowest taxed County in the State, while under Republican mismanagement it is rapidly becoming the highest.

There is but one remedy for this condition, let the power be wrested from the hands which now wield it, and let the party which has ever administered the fiscal affairs of the County economically and for the best interests of the people—the Democratic party—be again trusted with authority. The power to do this is in the hands of the people. They can apply the remedy and let them now determine to do so in November.

GET TO WORK

Democrats, you are just entering upon the campaign of 1921, your ticket and your candidates are worthy of your united and earnest support. You have a wily and vigilant foe to contend against, one which will avail itself of every advantage presented. You must close ranks, and push forward, an set to work; lose not time, give the enemy no advantage through your delay. You must work to win. The committees can not do all the work. They must be helped. Let Democrats generally organize in every neighborhood and town, and do it at once. Don't defer and say there is time enough. The election is less than a month off. We can win by united effort, by getting out the vote. Get every man and woman worthy to be considered a Democrat to work in earnest and determine, not only to vote in November, but to see that their neighbors do, for it is by Democratic voters that our ticket will be elected this fall.
