

REDUCED SALARIES

WERE ORDERED BY BOARD OF EDUCATION TO TEACHERS WHO DID RE-NEW CERTIFICATES—MISS LANGVICK ELEMENTARY SUPERVISOR.

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was called to order in the office of the Board at 11.15 Wednesday morning, October 20th. President Wantz and Commissioner Feeser were absent.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The list of bills presented to the Board were approved and ordered paid.

The list of the teachers' appointments and their respective salaries was presented to the Board and approved. The following resolution was passed by the Board: That all teachers who failed to qualify during the past summer for the proper renewal of their certificates were not entitled to the full salary allowed for their grade of certificate, and therefore Superintendent Unger was authorized to reduce their salary to second class for the particular grade of certificate with the understanding that if they failed to qualify before the opening of school in 1922 their salary would go back to provisional grade and in case they did qualify for the renewal of their certificates by August 1st, they were to receive the regular salary allowed according to the certificate they held.

The vacancies in the Board of Trustees were filled as follows: Manchester—John Keck, and C. Stoffel.

Ottavale—C. A. Shoemaker and Clarence Shank.

Lingwood—Harry Reese, vs. J. E. Etzler.

Emory—Carroll Raver. Supt. Unger was directed to authorize President Wantz to secure a competent auditor to audit the books.

Supt. Unger was authorized to make an investigation with respect to the enrollment at the Hooper's and Good Hope Schools, and if it was found that the enrollment does not justify keeping the schools open the same were to be closed and the teachers to be transferred to schools that had a larger number of pupils.

The request for opening the Priestland school was laid before the Board but it was decided not to open this school in view of the fact that all children in this district could easily attend another school in this territory.

Supt. Unger reported to the Board that a delegation had been before him with respect to the transportation of children from the Freedom school district to Sykesville. After a very thorough discussion of this question the Board came to the conclusion that as it had put a request for funds for this purpose in the budget and that the same was cut out by the County Commissioners it would refuse to agree to any arrangement whatsoever for which it had to be responsible with respect to hauling the Freedom children.

It was decided with respect to the completion of the Meadow Branch school that the same rule should hold as in the case of hauling the Freedom children.

The committee on purchase of car reported to the Board that a Maxwell roadster had been bought for the use of the Supervisor.

Supt. Unger was directed to inform Mr. Thomas Kemp, Acting Manager of the Mt. Airy State Fair, that a half holiday would be given those schools where a great majority of the children accepted passes and intended to attend the show.

The committee consisting of Com. Feeser and Supt. Unger was continued to dispose of the Union Mills property.

Supt. Unger was authorized to issue the usual annual report.

The appointment of Miss Anna M. Langvick as Supervisor of elementary grades at a salary of \$2000 was approved by the Board.

A delegation from Leister's school appeared before the Board claiming enough children to open the school but it was found upon an investigation that a number of these children are in the Snyderburg and Royer's schools, and that there would not be a sufficient enrollment to justify opening the school.

Requests for contributions to local funds raised for libraries, etc. were presented to the Board which contributed ten (\$10) dollars to the amount already raised in each case, except in the case of New Windsor, it agreed to make the contribution 10 per cent of the amount raised by the school, which amounted to \$12.00.

BOARD OF EDUCATION BUYS LAND AT MT. AIRY.

The Board of Education of Carroll County has purchased from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad a lot of land containing 2.05 acres, adjacent to the high school lot at Mt. Airy, fronting about 300 feet on the Mt. Airy to Westminister state road and having a depth of the present property of the Mt. Airy high school lot. The grantor reserved the right for the use of pipe line to the Mary Garrett Sanitarium

which is on the opposite side of the road. The consideration is said to have been about \$1,000. Negotiations for the purchase of this property for the use of the public school at Mt. Airy were conducted by Charles F. Glover of Mt. Airy, a member of the Board of Education of Carroll County.

Mr. Glover has been very energetic and devoted to the work of the public schools and by his success in acquiring this lot of land the high school at Mt. Airy will have athletic grounds and the property will be greatly improved. Mr. Glover is entitled to this special word of praise for his work because the services rendered by the members of the Board of Education are practically gratis, the pay of a member being but \$100 per year, which is not intended as salary in fact but to cover the expenses of attending the meetings of the Board; it is fitting therefore that good work done by members of the Board be publicly recognized. While we are speaking about the public schools of Carroll County it might be well to observe that there has been a steady improvement in their general condition under the present Superintendent, Mr. M. S. H. Unger, and it has been brought about by hard and intelligent work on the part of Mr. Unger in behalf of the public schools in Carroll County and by capable and intelligent work on the part of the members of the Board of Education. There have been mistakes made, we have no doubt, but they have been blunders going forward, not going backwards.

Much elation is being felt and expressed over the coming of the Speaker for the Armory meeting, Hon. Wm. D. His fame and popularity have spread all over the United States and far into Canada. A large choir of fifty voices from all the churches will render special music at this meeting.

ZEALOUS PREACHER FINED \$25 FOR ATTACK ON "WET" JUDGE.

Bedford City, Va., Oct. 12.—Holding that preachers are dealing too much in politics now instead of preaching the gospel, Judge B. C. Scott, of Richmond, yesterday imposed a fine of \$25 on Rev. T. E. Boorde for alleged contemptuous remarks concerning Judge P. H. Dillard who, it was alleged, was referred to by the minister as a "wet" jurist.

Judge Scott held that citizens had a right to criticize Court decisions and judges that rendered them, but he said he did not think any man should be harangued when he is not present to defend himself. Judge Scott held that the Government provides machinery to remove a judge who is unfit to sit on the bench and it seemed to him best, he said, to use the legal rather than an illegal way.
