DEATHS.

FORSYTHE

On Monday morning, October 24th, 1921, William Henry Forsythe, one of the most prominent residents of Howard county, and widely known throughout the state, died at his home, "Oakland," Howard County, Md., after a lingering illness.

Mr. Forsythe was born in Howard County, June 26, 1842. On the breaking out of the civil war he enlisted in Company A, First Maryland Cavalry, C. S. A., and served throughout the war.

He is survived by one son, Judge William H. Forsythe, Jr., a granddaughter, Katherine Forsythe, and one brother, Arthur P. Forsythe, Sr. The deceased was for many years an active member of Harmony M. E. Church, South. The funeral took place on Wednesday at 2 p. m., from his late residence, "Oakland," the services being in charge of Rev. James C. Johnson, and Rev. F. P. Cain, of Howard County, and Rev. J. C. Hawk, of Washington. Interment was made in Oak Grove Cemetery, at Glenwood. A touching tribute to his memory was paid by four of the members of his old regiment, Messrs. John T. Ridgely, Sr., and Dorsey Thompson, of Howard County, John High, of Baltimore, and Soper Childs, of near Annapolis, who followed him to the cemetery.

ZENCKER

George Zencker, a well known farmer of the Fifth District of Baltimore county, died suddenly at his home near Mt. Carmel on Monday morning aged 65 years. Arising early apparently in as good health as usual, he began butchering some hogs for market, while engaged in this he was seen to fall and by the time that the men, who were assisting him reached his side, he was dead.

He is survived by his widow, also one sister, Mrs. Wm. Markey, of Glenoe and three brothers, Samuel, Daniel and John, all of the West. His funeral was held on Thursday morning at Beckleysville Lutheran church. Rev. Constance officiating, assisted by Rev. S. J. Derr. The pallbearers were Todd Ashe, Jos. BENNETT

Monday morning, October 24, Mr. Garrison L. Bennett, of near Slack's Corner, died after a short illness. Mr. Bennett, who was 35 years of age, was stricken with typhoid fever about two weeks ago and was later removed to the Maryland University Hospital, where his death occurred. One year ago he was married to Miss Leah Hammond, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Hammond, who survives him. He also leaves one sister, Miss Minnie Bennett, of Montgomery County, and three brothers, Dorsey and Fletcher, of Montgomery County, and George, of Sykesville.

The funeral services were held from St. Paul's Church on Wednesday morning, October 26, at 10.30 and were conducted by Rev. E. O. Pritchett and Rev. Carl Maxwell. Interment was made in Springfield cemetery.

SCHAEFFER

Mrs. Cornelia M. Schaeffer, 69 years old, for many years a resident of Hagerstown, died at her home, 489 South Boulevard, Sunday, October 9.

Surviving Mrs. Schaeffer are her husband, John H. Schaeffer, two sons, Frank, of Westminster, and Herbert H., of Hagerstown, and a daughter, Mrs. Harry E. Krake, of Washington, D. C.
