THE LAND OF THE SHOSHONIS

An evening of music and pictures with the description of the Shoshonis Indians of Idaho will be given by Miss Dorothy Elderlice at Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, Thursday, November 10th, at 8 o'clock for the benefit of the Ladies' Adult Bible class.

The Shoshonis Indians are one of the very few tribes in the United States who still engage in the sun dance, a picturesque survival of an ancient religious ceremony connected with the worship of the sun. "The Land of the Shoshonis" shows the dance as it was given in the willow tops on the bottoms July, 1921. The charm of Idaho is a strange combination of the romance that lies in the very, very old and the very, very new. Here is a section so old that one may see writing placed on rocks 5,000 years ago and yet so new that one may see uncounted acres of soil still waiting for the first planting. Miss Elderlice spent a full ten months in this wild and wonderful land and is full of love and enthusiasm and real knowledge of all the things of Idaho.
