INTEREST SHOWN IN POULTRY SHOW.

Officials of the University of Maryland are showing particular interest in the proposed formation of a State association of poultrymen at Westminster, November 16, in connection with the second annual Mid-State Poultry Show of the Carroll County Poultry Association.

Notice of the proposed meeting has been received by Dr. Thomas B. Symons, Director of the University of Maryland Extension Service, from Thomas W. Kemp, President of the Carroll County Association. The meeting will be presided over by Wade H. D. Wardfield, of Sykesville, and the program will include addresses by such bright lights in the poultry world as Frank S. Barr, President of the Pennsylvania State Poultry Association, J. Harry Welfel, poultry judge and former president of the University of Maryland Poultry Association; and D. Lincoln Orr, manager of the New York and Washington poultry shows.

Discussions which have been reserved for consideration at the organization meeting will include: Grading eggs for Maryland; Cooperative Buying and Selling; the Chinese Egg Menace; Advertising Eggs; Honesty in Advertising; and Poultry Shows. Efforts are being made to secure a representative attendance of poultrymen from all parts of the State.

W. M. COAL CHUTE ABANDONED

The coal chutes, at Cranberry, were closed at midnight Tuesday. All trains will receive coal at Union Bridge hereafter and as soon as the water tanks are completed, no trains will take water at Cranberry. This movement of the company has dismissed six men that were employed at the chutes on eight hour shifts. The men will seek employment elsewhere. The new chutes at Union Bridge does away with five men. Everything is worked by electricity which requires one man to do the work. The fireman on the locomotives loads the tender of the engine by simply pulling a chain which works the dump. The first train to coal was the fast mail Tuesday afternoon.

Senate and House In Control of Democrats---Kentucky Returns to Democratic Fold--- Mayor Hyland, Democrat, Re-elected Mayor of New York by 425,000.

REPUBLICANS WIN IN CARROLL.

The Republican ticket was successful in Carroll County for every office except County Treasurer, Samuel J. Stone, Democrat, being re-elected. Spencer for House of Delegates, escaped defeat by 29. Repp defeated Hann by 308. Mellor's majority over Boyle was 875. Bricker leads Weer by 754. Martin's majority over Bowers is 845. The official vote by districts is given below:

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A State-wide Democratic tide on Tuesday swept the Democratic candidate for Comptroller into office; gave the Democrats 21 out of 27 State Senators and about 70 out of 105 members of the House of Delegates.

William S. Gordy, Jr., the Democratic candidate for Comptroller, was given a plurality in the counties and city of 24,378. When this is contrasted with the 55,000 plurality given President Harding last fall the result is considered all the more remarkable and indicative of an unmistakable swing of sentiment back toward the Democratic side. The Democrats of Baltimore City elect every candidate to the Legislature, being 24.

In the Senatorial fights, of which there were 12, the Democrats won 10. The only real fight went to the Republicans was in Caroline, where Lawrence B. Towers, Republican, defeated Dr. M. Bates Stephens, Democrat. It was expected that Towers would show strength, but that his victory should be as decisive as it was probably a surprise even to Mr. Towers himself.

In two Republican counties the Democrats won, although the result had been forecast before the election. In Garrett, with a heavy affiliated Republican majority, John W. McCutcheon, Democrat, won over John Shartzler, Republican, by about 270 votes. Here it is believed that the bitterness between Shartzler and Senator Harvey J. Speicher, augmented by the primary, was responsible for Shartzler's defeat.

In Charles county, where negroes outnumber whites, and where there is in consequence a heavy Republican majority, Senator Walter J. Mitchell was returned to the Senate over Albert J. Lomax, Republican. Here it is believed that certain Republican friends of Senator Mitchell had something to do with the result.

St. Mary's and Dorchester were considered very doubtful counties by the Democrats, and the ones with which they won is another indication of the Democratic swing. Harford, Cecil, Montgomery and Talbot were expected to go Democratic. The fight in the last, however, was very close. McDaniel for some reason running away behind Gordy. He only won by around 150 votes. Benjamin W. Fox, Democrat, was elected Senator in the Fourth district of Baltimore city, defeating Charles H. Heintzman, Republican.

There were fewer upsets in the House of Delegates' contests than among those for Senate. Democrats secured solid delegations from 17 out of 20 districts in Baltimore city, Baltimore county, Wicomico, Talbot, Caroline, Queen Anne's, Kent, Harford, Anne Arundel, St. Mary's, Worcester and Montgomery. The Republicans secured solid delegations in Garrett, Allegany, Charles, Calvert, Carroll and Somerset. The Democrats took two out of six in Washington county, two out of five in Frederick, four out of five in Prince George's, two out of three in Cecil, two out of three in Dorchester and one out of two in Howard.

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THE COUNTY EXHIBIT

MANY EXHIBITORS WILL BE ON HAND—CHAIRMAN OF DIFFERENT COMMITTEES NAMED.

Tuesday night, November 29th, will be opening night. Dr. Ward, of Westminster Maryland College, has been asked to preside, and Rev. Wake will give a talk on Community Cooperation. This will be followed by a general discussion from the floor in regard to what Westminster and community can do.

Dr. Symons will speak to the men in the afternoon on the Farmer's Cooperative Association. At the same time Miss Stewart, of the Maryland Institute of Arts, who will have an exhibit of art work will give a short talk on color and design. Miss Bertha Knight, of the University of Chicago, will give an illustrated talk on home furnishings. This year the Art Exhibit will be placed on the platform in the Armory so as to give more people a chance to see it. This is in charge of the art committee: Mrs. John Bennett, chairman, Mrs. Bessie Roberts, Mrs. Wm. R. McDaniel, Mrs. Hamer, Miss Mary Cunningham, Miss Lillian Shipley, and Mrs. Katherine Sharrer.

Dr. Symons will be the chief speaker for Wednesday evening and will talk on the comparative farm life of the American and European people. Dr. Symons has been abroad studying marketing conditions, he is an entertaining speaker, and those of you who heard him at the County Picnic will be anxious to hear him again.

On Thursday there will be a Woman's Meeting in the afternoon at the Armory. Mrs. J. Edgar Myers is chairman and health will be the subject under discussion. Miss Nellie Brady, of Baltimore, will give an illustrated talk on the relation of foods to health, and a speaker from the Children's Bureau is also expected who will talk on the care of the children during the pre-school age.

Thursday night, Dr. Burdick, of the Public Athletic League, will tell us how we can provide worthwhile entertainment and also give us some plans for a Short Course on games and recreation which we expect to have in Westminster the beginning of the year. A speaker from Hagerstown is also expected to tell us what that community has done.

Friday afternoon will be demonstration afternoon. We expect a team of three girls to give a demonstration in bread making. There will also be a demonstration on the making of the dress form. Mrs. Guy Nusbaum will have charge. Friday night, Mr. McSparran, of Pennsylvania, will be the chief speaker.

Saturday will be Boys' and Girls' Day and a moving picture film will be shown.
