YORK COW BREAKS RECORD

York, Pa., Dec. 11.—Hilpline Flora Fundera a 2-year-old Holstein junior heifer on the Robertson farm, has exceeded the State record in the matter of milk production and still has 98 days of her year remaining. The heifer's total production to date has been 17,140 pounds, while the State record for cows of the age is 16,000 pounds. At the present rate she will produce 21,000 pounds in the year.

DISTINGUISHED SPEAKERS AT CONVOCAION ON LIMITATION OF ARMAMENT

Both men and women of distinction and outstanding leadership will be heard at the Convocation of Christian Citizens in behalf of the limitation of armament which holds its sessions in the Central High School and New Masonic Auditoriums, at Washington, D. C., from Sunday, October 30th, through Wednesday, November 2nd, under the direction of the National Reform Association. The association itself has a staff of internationally known speakers, who will be present and speak at the Convocation. These include its general superintendent, James S. Martin, the originator and successful director of three great World Christian Citizenship Conferences; James S. McGaw, its general field secretary, and known as "America's rapid-fire civic evangelist"; Sam W. Small, the famous Southern humorist, orator and evangelist; Clinton N. Howard, the "Little Giant" of the American platform, and Edwin C. Dinwiddie, recent president of the International Anti-Alcoholic Congress.

Other speakers of distinction include a United States senator, a representative, a beloved bishop, famous authors and widely known leaders in the war on war.



Among the women who will be present at the Convocation on the limitation of armament is Mrs. Thomas G. Winter of Minneapolis, Minn., the popular president of the National Federation of Women's Clubs, who will speak on Monday afternoon, October 31st, at the New Masonic Auditorium on the subject, "Internal Development Hindered by Militarism." Another woman of charming personality is Mrs. Deborah Knox Livingston of Providence, Rhode Island, superintendent of the Christian Citizenship Department of the National W. C. T. U., who will be heard Monday evening in the Central High School Auditorium on the subject, "Applied Christianity in Relation to War."

"The Portal of Peace"



On the doors of this newly erected gateway between the United States and Canada at Blaine, Washington, are the words "Open for One Hundred Years" and "May These Doors Never Be Closed." That Canada and the United States have lived together in peace for 106 years is a testimony to the value of disarmament and the importance of the coming International Conference on the limitation of armament which begins its sessions November 11th. What Uncle Sam and his neighbor can do, can also be done by other nations. If the nations of the world had had the common sense to disarm as the United States and Canada have

done, there would have been no World War.

As this arch is a visible token of faith in disarmament, so a spiritual impulse is to be given to this faith by the Convocation of citizens called by the National Reform Association to meet in Washington, D. C., Sabbath October 30, to November 2. To this Convocation representatives of many national peace and civic associations are coming. Representatives of churches and Bible classes will also be present, as well as many individuals not official delegates from any organization. No credentials or formal introduction are required. Daily sessions afternoons and evenings will be held in the New Masonic and Central High School auditoriums.

"THE DRAGON'S TEETH"

"The Dragon's Teeth," a vivid phrase recalling the ancient myth that the teeth of the dragon when sown sprang up as armed men, is the title chosen by Dr. Henry Van Dyke for his address to be given at the Convocation of Christian Citizens in behalf of limitation of armament which is to meet at Washington, D. C., on Sunday, October 30th, and is to continue in session for four days. Dr. Van Dyke is not only recognized as one of America's foremost poets and authors, but also as one of its most talented platform orators. His address on "The World to Be" created a profound impression at the Third World's Christian Citizenship Conference held in Pittsburgh two years ago under the direction of the National Reform Association, which is conducting the coming Convocation at Washington.

Dr. Van Dyke has had opportunity to learn the realities of war since he was Minister of the United States to the Netherlands for three years during the World War and was entrusted with serious responsibility by his

country—responsibility which he met in a masterful way. He is now a recognized leader in the effort for world peace.

WHAT THE MARYLAND FIRE PREVENTION CAMPAIGN MEANS

It is an ambitious and comprehensive undertaking that the fire prevention forces in Maryland are attempting. Fire Prevention Day, October 10, is to be recognized in that State, but only as an incident in a larger struggle for permanent accomplishments. W. R. Hough, one of Baltimore's fire commissioners, and B. S. Mace, fire prevention engineer of the B. and O. Railroad, are the capable leaders in a campaign to which the Governor of Maryland and the Mayor of Baltimore have pledged their interest and support. It gives one a pleasant sensation to see two citizens of a State put their shoulders to the wheel in a work of this sort simply because they understand the importance of it to their fellow citizens and want to make a contribution of public service.

Every fire is local; it must start somewhere; therefore, it is where it may start that interest and attention must be focused.

There are really but two things that can be done to check our astounding fire losses. One is to correct the habits of our people, to inspire in them the habit of carefulness; the other is to do positive physical acts like cleaning up basements, attics and yards, and inspecting and correcting defects in school houses, stores, houses and other buildings.

The Maryland group is to do both of these things. From the Governor down it is to stimulate and inform the everyday people of the State what the fire waste means; and then, having done this, it is to point out the physical means for its abatement. This is a job that will require patience, energy and persistence, but if the public-spirited gentlemen who have launched this campaign attract to it the support and co-operation such an effort deserves the Maryland group will write their names into the history of their State.
