Christmas throughout the eastern half of the country will be preceded by abnormally cold weather, the Weather Bureau declares.

On account of general depression in business the W. M. R. R. has laid off a number of workmen in Cumberland. We don't hear of a reduction in the officials or officers forces.

Mr. David Myers has erected a residence on George street. All the material, except the foundation was purchased from a Western syndicate, and was sent in sections.

President Harding sent to the Senate for confirmation the name of William C. Sharrer, for Postmaster of Manchester, to succeed Postmaster Shower, whose time has expired.

In Pike County, Va., thus far this season 260 deer, thirty-two bears, one wildcat and one wild boar have been killed. It is expected this record will be largely increased before the close of the season.

Arnold Heltz, 31 years old, of Brockton, Pa., was kicked to death by a mule at Silver Creek colliery. Heltz was passing in the rear of the mule and had turned when the animal with one stroke kicked him in the intestines, causing internal hemorrhages.

H. B. Gingrich, of Shamokin Dam, Pa., charged with attempting to extort \$200 from Joseph Van Horn, a hotel man, by representing himself to be a dry agent, pleaded guilty in Snyder county Court and was sentenced by Judge Johnson to pay a fine of \$10, the costs of prosecution and serve three months.

Investigation into the charges brought against Milton E. Eckstein and John B. Ernst, prohibition agents, of being under the influence of liquor Saturday night, at the Hotel Belvedere, Baltimore, is being conducted by the Washington office of the enforcement bureau, the men having been lent to Director Budnitz.

Miss Muriel Spring, film actress and former Follies beauty, was arrested recently in New York and accused of smuggling \$15,000 worth of dresses and jewelry into this country from Paris without paying customs duty. Evidence was that she had brought with her last November a valuable diamond anklet, many costly gowns and jewels. She is under bail for a further hearing in February.

George McDonald, a miner of Columbia, Huntington county, Pa., is dead and his wife, Olive Long McDonald, is in a serious condition at a hospital, as the result of a shooting at Cassandra. According to the authorities who investigated, McDonald went to the home of Charles Long, brother of his wife and asked her to return to Columbia with him. The wife, it is said, was keeping house for Long during the absence of his wife, who is in a hospital. She refused, according to reports, and she shot her twice, one bullet passing through her lung, after which McDonald killed himself.

Roger D. Eastlake, former navy petty officer charged with the murder of his wife, Margaret Eastlake, at their home at Colonial Beach, Va., on September 30, last, was found not guilty by a jury in the Westmoreland County Circuit Court.

John Elmer, 41 years old, of Lost Creek, Pa., a suburb, with a wife and 10 children, while under the influence of drink, including much "hoop," attempted suicide by shooting himself in the left breast, just above the heart.

Paul, little son of Truman E. Lambert, New Windsor, fell while playing with the other boys at school a few days ago and broke a small bone in his right arm. This makes his third similar accident, having had his left arm broke twice before.

For the first time in the history of the Maryland courts a juror was sentenced to three months in Baltimore City Jail for improper conduct in the Jury Room while deliberating on a case. George B. Hitchcock, the juror found guilty of contempt, was sentenced by Judge Duffy to serve the three-month term and also to pay the costs in the case amounting to more than \$100.

Mrs. Rebecca Warner, Union Bridge, was notified of the sudden death of her brother, John Groff, of Washington. Mr. Groff was a guard, at the White House entrance and died Saturday of last week while on duty from heart trouble. He was 60 years of age.

Feigartia, it is alleged, drew his saw, and it is said gambled the full amount and rather than face his wife and children ended his life.

Thirty-nine gallons of whiskey are reported to have come out of the water of the abandoned quarry at Sylmar, Pa., Friday. When the amateurs who are daily dragging hooks along the bottom brought the barrel to the surface, there was joy intense, and quick-ly the prize was moved to an even more remote hiding place. Even the owner of the abandoned quarry, Mr. LaForge, the superintendent at the plant got an inkling early in the evening that a man would arrive here on the late train with a supply of "likker" for some of the Company's employees, and accordingly kept a lookout for him. Soon after the train reached town he was seen on the Company's grounds headed for the homes of the foreign element. When questioned what he was carrying he answered without evasion and his arrest followed. At the hearing it was learned that the liquor was to have been used in a birth celebration among the foreigners as is their custom.—The Pilot of December 16.
