THIRD DEFICIENCY BILL FOR 1922

It has been a matter of speculation here for some days whether the next move of the administration would be to call another conference or present another deficiency bill.

As far back as last December Senator King (Dem., Utah), referring to a deficiency bill then under consideration, said: "Usually deficiency appropriation bills come in after the expiration of the fiscal year."

It is explained, however, that the total amount submitted in this third deficiency bill that \$110,857,318.24 has been included in the estimates of expenditures for 1922.

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TANKAGE PROFITABLE DESPITE CHEAP CORN FOR FATTENING HOGS

Despite the low prices for corn, it is quite profitable to supplement the corn ration for hogs with tankage, according to W. L. Robison, swine specialist at the Ohio Experiment Station.

Tests show that approximately 15 bushels of corn when fed alone is required to carry a 40-pound pig to a weight of 200 pounds, while only 10 bushels is needed when the corn is supplemented with tankage.

When a ration of corn is supplemented at the rate of one part tankage to nine parts of corn by weight, a 40-pound pig will have consumed approximately 60 pounds of tankage by the time it has reached a weight of 200 pounds.

Besides the saving in corn which at 42 cents a bushel would give the tankage a feeding value of 3.5 cents a pound, the use of tankage increased the average daily gain from five-tenths to one and two-tenths pounds.

Middlings or linseed meal and similar feeds may also be used to advantage at times to replace a part of such high-priced feeds as tankage, but in winter feeding at least should not be depended upon as complete substitutes for tankage.

"OLDEST PERSON IN WORLD" DIES AT 137

Cass Lake, Minn., Feb. 7.—Ga-be-nah-gew-wo-nce, also known as John Smith, a Chippewa Indian reputed to be 137 years old, died here today, of pneumonia.

The United States Bureau of Indian Affairs, the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society and other historical societies had been led to accept the claim of Ga-be-nah-gew-wo-nce and his fellow Indians that he was "the oldest living person in the world."

Also known as Wah-la-gunta, he was firemaker of the Blackfeet tribe. He outlived several wives, and when long past the century mark he was still young enough to woo another.

The "falling of the stars," the shower of meteors that occurred in 1833, he recalled minutely. He was about forty years old at that time.
