THREE KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT.

Three men were killed and one other injured when a Buick roadster in which they were riding struck an iron trolley pole on Gay street, near Fallsview, Baltimore, early Sunday morning. The auto struck the iron upright with such force that the pole split through the machine to the rear of the driver's seat. The engine of the car was driven through the side of the automobile like cardboard and thrown 50 feet, while the dead and injured were tossed in some instances nearly 100 feet away.

The machine was owned by William F. Gill, Jr., of Baltimore, who is a whiskey gauger and was on his way home from Horsey Distillery at Burkittsville. Mr. Gill was driving the car and received a broken arm and internal injuries and is at the Mercy Hospital in a critical condition. Mr. Gill

MANY ARE KILLED WHEN AVALANCHE HITS TRAIN

Tokio, Feb. 6.—Seventy-nine bodies had been recovered today from the wrecked train which was buried by an avalanche Saturday at Itogawa Station. Thirty-three injured passengers also had been extricated.

Most of the victims, according to advices reaching here, were crushed when the roofs of the coaches collapsed under the weight of rocks and snow. Three hundred ex-soldiers, firemen and coolies are still engaged in the work of rescue. It was believed today that at least a dozen bodies are still buried under the wreckage.

BRUTES STRIP 11-YEAR OLD GIRL OF CLOTHES

The five McBride brothers of Top, Mercer county, W. Va., who are alleged to have kidnapped 11-year-old Eliza Mills from her home, carried her into the mountains and stripped her of clothing in zero weather, have been captured. Later they returned to their parents' home, it is alleged, tied by the elder Mills and placed his bare feet over a red hot fire, horribly burning them, because he had threatened vengeance on them. The men were taken by State troopers and lodged in jail.

Not in the history of West Virginia mountain criminology have there been known such atrocities as were practiced on the 11-year-old girl and her father, it is said. After the girl had been taken from her home she was carried into the wilderness and attacked frequently by each of the McBrides.

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
