GETS 92 HICCUGH CURES

York, Pa., Feb. 16.—Ninety-two cures including several interesting ones from Philadelphia, were received by O. Roland Read, of this city, when a recent prolonged attack of hiccoughs gained him a paragraph in State newspapers. Read said today that, while most of the cures came by letter, he had several offered by telegraph and by long distance telephone.

Not all were from persons in obscure positions. An Assistant Postmaster General wrote from Washington, D. C., to suggest something that had given him relief from a similar attack, and a very prominent Quaker City physician sent a prescription which he said he had found effective in his practice.

DOG CLINGS TO CAB WHEN MASTER DIED

Waverly, Minn., Feb. 24.—A little black mongrel dog clings persistently to the cab of the passenger engine lying wrecked in a ditch near here. Somewhere beneath the wreckage of that and two other engines the body of his master lies.

Riding with his master, the dog escaped injury in the wreck and the first rescuers found him, dazed and bewildered, clinging to a precarious position atop the wrecked cab that had housed his master.

SIX LOCOMOTIVES FORCE PLOW

THROUGH SNOW-CHOKED PASS COLORADO RAILROADS BURIED UNDER THOUSANDS OF TONS OF DEBRIS AFTER MOUNTAIN SNOW SLIDES.

Durango, Col., Feb. 13.—A giant rotary plow, backed by six engines, battling through snow in Cumbres Pass, that towered to a height of more than six feet above the coaches, to-day broke the way for the first train to reach Durango from the East since last Thursday night. The blockade was one of the worst of the winter.

The Rio Grande Southern road is blocked by numerous snowdrifts between Dolores and Ophir Loop. Yesterday's train ran out of water for the engine and was stalled in the heavy snow a few miles from Rico. It was expected the passengers would be removed today and the train pulled back to Dolores.

A snowslide a mile wide is reported at Lizard Head, thousands of tons of snow, logs and rock blocking the right of way, Silverton still is isolated.
