Elevation 200 feet, fine drainage, splendid water, etc."

Cigar Making Is Dull

An acquaintance from Hanover remarked "The cigar-making has received a slump which will last a long time. Some factories cut down the number to be made each day, which amounts to about the same as the cut in working days. It is natural, when so many necessities must come first. A merchant informed us that 3 cent cigars were the lowest-priced, while some cigars sell readily at 8 cents even in the small stores. Ten years ago, when we were in the mercantile business, a regular customer would frequently come in for a quarter's worth of "Penny Cents," expecting 26 for 25 cents. Verily, times have changed in recent years, and it is not likely that some things will ever reach normal again."

Style in Men's Wearing Apparel.

Of course, men have styles, exclusively their own, down in Mexico. A Mexican will go barefoot and wear ragged trousers if only he may possess a hat which will awaken the envy of his companions. Those who work for 2 cents and 30 cents a day have been known to go without proper food and to wear clothing that was in tatters in order to save a sum sufficient to buy a hat adorned with braid and tinsel. Many of the hats of the Mexican gentlemen of wealth have bands and rims of inlaid gold and silver, with valuable gems set in the crown. Sometimes the band is a solid circle of one dollar or half-dollar silver pieces. They weigh heavy of course, often six or eight pounds.

Conditions in Russia.

Shiphoad after shiphoad of provisions, the best to be found in America, are being sent to "Starving Russia," regardless of the thousands of hungry poor here at home. A weekly newspaper "Friend to Russia," is collecting tens of thousands of dollars from America to aid the poor, and the churches of Russia. Let us try to learn the cause of Russia's suffering. Intensive Farming.
