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FACTS PRESENTED BY M. C. BYERS

President of Western Maryland Railway Tells Why Road Adopted Repair Contract Plan.

In response to an invitation of the Baltimore Sun, Maxwell C. Byers, President of the Western Maryland Railway Company, has prepared for that newspaper a statement giving the reasons why the railway company placed its repair work in the hands of a contracting company, a move which has led to a strike of certain employees.

The statement is important because of its bearing on the strike in question and also because it reveals that the determined policy of railroad companies is to strive to restore normal freight and passenger rates.

Mr. Byers in his statement gives expression to many vital points involved in the present railroad situation.

"The business of the Western Maryland Railway Company," says Mr. Byers, "is transportation or the operation of freight and passenger trains. The company has not contracted, nor has it in contemplation contracting, this work or any part of it.

The repair of locomotives and cars is incidental to the business of running trains, and the question of whether the railway company itself do such repair work or have it done by other companies under contract has been determined, and ought to be determined by the management, and by other railroads also with a view primarily to economy.

"There never was a time when there was so great a need for economy in railroad operation as today. This is true in the interests of the public, for whether freight and passenger rates are high or low depends on what it costs the railroads to operate.

"The Western Maryland could not accomplish this result by sending engines and cars to Philadelphia, or to some other point where large construction or repairs concerns are located, because of the cost of transportation, the profit which the contractors under these conditions would necessarily have insisted on to cover overhead, etc., but after diligent effort we found that we could secure a contractor who was willing to come on the ground and because of utilizing the existing shops, roundhouses and other facilities of the railway company, and a consequent low overhead, would accept an extremely small margin of profit and thus allow the railway company to effect the economy of operation which the plan was designed to accomplish.

"The Western Maryland is not alone in making these contracts. Among the other roads which have made them are the Great Northern, the Erie, the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, the New York Central, the St. Louis-San Francisco and others.

"Are the employees of the contractor being treated unfairly? Not, judged by the standards of what men doing exactly the same kind of work in outside industries along the Western Maryland Railway are making. The average mechanic along the Western Maryland in outside industries is making fifty cents per hour; the contractor's employees doing exactly the same kind of work demand an average rate of seventy cents an hour.

"Compare wages received per month by shop mechanics on the following basis: "Labor Board rates of 77c per hour, 8-hour day, 6-day week, 4-week month—\$147.84.

"Dickson Construction & Repair Co. rate, 60c per hour, 10-hour day, 6-day week, 4-week month—\$144.

"Henry Ford employs mechanics at \$5 per day of eight hours, 5-day week, 4-week month—\$109.

"I do not know of any farmer or business or professional man who does not have to work harder and longer hours today to make the same amount of money that he made during prosperous war times. It does not seem unreasonable to ask labor to do the same thing."
