BOUNTY MAKING HAWKS SCARCE IN HOWARD CO.

ADDITIONAL FUND PROVIDED BY GOV. RITCHIE BEING HIT HARD.

The raid on the hawks of Howard county is keeping apace with the raid on the county fund, which recently has been increased by Governor Ritchie for the State Game Warden's department.

Game officials predict that Howard county will soon be as hawkless as the rest of the State. The bounty on hawks is being paid at the rate of trapping and skinning. Every day there comes into the office of Warden DeCompte a fresh batch of claims for hawk bounties. It was only the other day that one claim of \$68 was paid. A district deputy game warden estimated that 1,200 hawks had been either trapped or killed in Howard county since the first of the fiscal year, beginning last fall, when the bounty provisions became generally known.

As was told a few weeks ago, the \$500 bounty fund provided at the first of the fiscal year had been exhausted and claims were piling up. Governor Ritchie then became interested in the movement to wipe out the hawks, which are so destructive to other birds and small animals, and provided a \$1,000 special fund for bounties. It is estimated that as much as \$400 of this new fund already is gone.

Hawks were so numerous some time ago around Ellicott City, according to District Deputy Warden Robert E. Day, of Howard county, that small game was fast disappearing. He said he had heard of one instance where a hunter had carried off a bird killed by a hawk before the gunner could reach it. Now, he said, it would be hard to find a hawk anywhere within a radius of 10 miles of that city. While he estimated that 1,200 hawks had been killed in the county there were many left.

"Some men have set traps," said Day, "and have brought in as many as 50 hawks at a time. They use steel traps, set in tree tops or on poles. The hawk will swoop down on the carefully camouflaged and baited trap and at once he is good for a half dollar bounty."

ALLEGED BOOTLEGGER GETS FEDERAL APPOINTMENT.

It now develops, according to Senator McKellar, that a nephew of Overall, at Liberty, Tenn., by the name of Whaley, has just been appointed to office, and who, according to the Senator, "enjoys the proud distinction of having been indicted a short while ago for bootlegging, and numerous other charges have been filed against him."

After calling attention to discriminations against ex-service men in the matter of post office appointments in the designation of civilians over veterans with a higher rating, Senator McKellar cited another case to show what happens when no civilians take the examination. He said:

"A remarkable thing happened at McKenzie, Tenn.; three Democratic ex-service men were on the eligible list. That presented a problem indeed to our Republican Civil Service Commission and to our Republican administration. Thereupon somebody asked for a rehearing, and the Civil Service Commission, set aside the examination, which they themselves had held, and set aside the eligible list, and now they are going to have another examination."

"This is one effect the President's order has had. It is a fake order so far as civil service is concerned. So far as the ex-service man is concerned it is a complete hoax."
