MORSE PARDON PETITIONS INCREASE MORAL TURPITUDE

The attempt of Attorney General Daugherty to shield himself in the Morse case by getting behind the petitions for Morse's pardon signed by Senators and Representatives and other prominent men has not created the favorable impression evidently hoped for and expected. These petitions were obtained by the wife of Charles W. Morse based upon representations that Morse was in a dying condition, and few men are able to resist the appeal of a sorrowing wife and mother in such circumstances.
