CARROLL ENDEAVORERS MEET

The thirty-first annual convention of the Carroll County Christian Endeavor Union was held at Deer Park Methodist Protestant Church, Smallwood, last week, and was more largely attended than any previous convention.

The Rev. John N. Link, pastor, conducted the devotional service and the music was in charge of Richard A. Harris with special numbers by the Carrollton Male Chorus, a mixed choir, and a duet by Mrs. Ivan Sayers and Miss Elsie Conaway. Addresses were made by State President George J. Rittenbush, State Secretary Spencer E. Sisco, Field Secretary Carroll M. Wright, Junior Superintendent George P. Smith, the Rev. Leonard E. Smith, of Wilmington, Del.; the Rev. Dr. Wilson T. M. Annan, of Taneytown; literature superintendent, Miss Eurieth Evans, Carrollton; pastoral counselor, the Rev. John N. Link, Smallwood. Two invitations having been received for the next convention, both invitations were accepted in the order given. The next convention to be held at the Bethel Church of God, at Carrollton, and the 1924 convention at the Lutheran Church, Keysville.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote: "Realizing the arrogance of the bootlegger and attending evils, the Carroll County C. E. Union, in session at Deer Park Methodist Protestant Church, deprecates such lawlessness. We therefore renew our determination to help stop such lawlessness, and to inform such violators that we are on the job to see it through.
