WHISKY BANDITS STEAL 181 BARRELS IN BIG RAID THREATEN GUARDS AT DISTILLERY WITH DEATH AND LESURELY LOAD 16 MOTOR TRUCKS

More than 50 men, armed with sawed-off shotguns, broke into the Foust distillery, at Glen Rock, Friday, at midnight and carried away 181 barrels of whisky, valued at \$181,000. Two guards, George A. Strine and Joseph Henry, were covered with guns and threatened with death if they made any resistance. The whisky was carried away in 16 trucks.

Below the Mason and Dixon Line the trucks separated and six of them were seen, still heading south, at 7 o'clock Saturday morning. Some of the trucks became mired on a road near Wileys Mill, Md., where a farmer was paid \$100 to get them over a hill by the aid of a tractor, horses and mules. A driver of a truck who was arrested at Stewartstown for disorderly conduct is believed to have been a member of the gang. He was committed to the Stewartstown jail, but the jailer found a note from a brother and the prisoner got out. It is believed that other members of the gang held him to escape.

John Foust, owner of the distillery, declared that none of the whisky stolen was his property, as it already had been sold. He said, however, that he is responsible to the Government for the tax, which amounts to \$6.40 a gallon. Unless he is exonerated from payment on the stolen whisky he will have to turn over nearly \$55,000. He also stated that 131 barrels of whisky remained in the warehouse and the Internal Revenue Bureau notified the local office to increase the guards at the distillery to protect it.

ONE KILLED IN HOLD UP. As the result of a desperate battle between rival gangs of men who, the police say, are known to them as bootleggers, one man is dead, another seriously injured and 5 more are suffering from bullet wounds and several more otherwise injured, Saturday night. 30 persons were arrested by policemen co-operating with Anne Arundel officers. The battle, which occurred at Belle Grove Inn, a resort off the Annapolis road, began as a hold-up when the inn and grove were crowded with men and women. A panic followed, in which the curses of the men were mingled with the screams of the women. One of the women was wounded. About \$1000 was secured. Six hundred dollars was taken from the money drawer and \$400 from a safe.

BURGLARS HELP A VICTIM Lebanon, Pa., July 12.—Two burglars entered the Hunsicker engine plant here early this morning, shot and wounded Solomon Boyer, the watchman, and, after smashing the company safe and taking about \$100, dressed Boyer's wounds, made him as comfortable as possible and escaped. After attacking Boyer the burglars bound him with wire before starting work on the company safe. The watchman later loosened his bonds and notified the authorities. He refused to go to a hospital and at his home physicians removed the bullet and said his condition was not serious.

The safe of the Lebanon Valley Furniture Company also was broken but nothing of value except a small quantity of stamps was taken.
