Voters, Attention!

Contemptible Plot by Anti-Saloon League to Defeat Senator Tydings Is Exposed.

Charges in Horace Davis Letter Proven To Be Absolutely False.

Many voters of the Second Congressional District have already received a copy of a letter signed by a certain Horace Davis, of Berlin, Maryland, dated August 8, 1922, reflecting on the character and standing of Senator Millard E. Tydings, of Harford County, now candidate for the Democratic nomination for congress from this District, by charging him with being intoxicated on one occasion at Carvel Hall Hotel, Annapolis, while a member of the State Senate. In this letter Mr. Davis mentions, as supporting evidence, Senator Towers (Republican), Speaker Lee, Miss Risteau, Mr. John T. Norris and others to substantiate his statements made therein.

A copy of the above letter was sent to Senator Towers, of Caroline County, Speaker J. L. G. Lee, Delegates Marv E. W. Risteau and James T. Norris, of Harford County, and William J. Seelye, Clerk in charge at Carvel Hall at the time of the alleged occurrence, and the following replies have been received:

"I have received your letter of September 1st, enclosing copy of letter signed by Mr. Horace Davis, referring to your conduct at Annapolis. After reading the letter, would say that I recall the night you came in the Smoking Room at Carvel Hall about 10.30 P. M. and indulged in a little horse-play and fun, in which I saw nothing objectionable, as I took it all in a spirit of fun—nor anything which in my opinion would reflect on your standing as a Senator or as a gentleman.

"I regret that my name is connected in any way with this matter, but I feel that I owe it to you to make this statement.

"With best wishes, I remain, Very truly yours, (Signed) Lawrence B. Towers."

"I acknowledge receipt of your letter, enclosing a copy of letter signed by Horace Davis, from Berlin, Md., dated August 10, 1922, in which he refers to your actions in the smoking room at Carvel Hall. I recall this night after some thought, when Mr. Davis and Senator Towers were present, and you came in.

"I wish to say that neither on this occasion nor at any other time during the three sessions you have stayed at Carvel Hall, have I ever seen you under the influence of liquor, nor have I ever seen any unbecoming conduct on your part in any way whatsoever.

"Regretting that you have been embarrassed by such an unwarranted attack, and assuring you all who know you, your hear their confidence, respect and esteem, I am, Yours truly, (Signed) Wm. J. Seelye, Clerk, Carvel Hall Hotel."

"I received a copy of the letter of Horace Davis, of date August 10, 1922, addressed to G. W. Crabbe, in which he accuses Senator Tydings of being under the influence of liquor on one occasion at Carvel Hall, Annapolis, during the last session of the Legislature.

"I remember the occasion distinctly. Senator Tydings was with me at my Committee Room in the State House, on official business, and we went together from there to Carvel Hall, where we saw and talked with Mr. Davis, Senator Towers, Mr. Seelye and others, and afterwards I went with the Senator to his room in Carvel Hall, and spent some time there with him.

"I am willing to take oath that Senator Tydings was not under the influence of liquor on that occasion, and did not show evidence that he had anything intoxicating to drink. I was with him for some time before we went to Carvel Hall, and know he had not taken a drink during that time.

"I wish to say further that I was closely associated with Senator Tydings during the past two sessions of the Legislature, and during that time never saw him under the influence of intoxicants, or conducting himself in any way except as a gentleman.

(Signed) Walter J. Mitchell.

"In the letter of Mr. Horace Davis to Mr. G. W. Crabbe, under date of August 10, 1922, Mr. Davis has seen fit to use my name.

"While I did not see Senator Tydings the night referred to, yet the following morning I overheard Mr. Davis' conversation with Mr. James T. Norris and others, in which Senator Tydings' name was used.

"Immediately after the House of Delegates adjourned, I asked Mr. Davis for an explanation of his remarks concerning Harford's Senator. The conversation, as reported in Mr. Davis' letter, is absolutely false. I told Mr. Davis that, and I wish to repeat it here, 'I can't believe it, Mr. Davis, there's some mistake; I have known Senator Tydings since 1910, and I have never seen nor heard of his being intoxicated.'

"Mr. Horace Davis said Senator Tydings' hand was cut and bleeding. I went directly to Senator Tydings, and asked to see his hand. It did not have a bruise or cut upon it of any kind. I told the Senator of Mr. Davis' accusation, and the Senator not only denied the charge, but gave me several names of persons present, and asked me to see them.

"In reply to your inquiry I wish to state that I did not go to Mr. Horace Davis at any time making inquiries about the conduct of Senator Millard E. Tydings, of Harford County.

"I wish further to state that I was a member of the House of Delegates in 1922 from Harford County, and neither during the session or at any other time have I ever seen Senator Tydings intoxicated or under the influence of liquor.

"I have read a copy of the Horace Davis letter, in which he says I asked him and others about Senator Tydings' conduct on an occasion at Carvel Hall, mentioned in said letter.

"I wish to say that I never had a conversation with Mr. Davis, Senator Towers, or anyone else as to Senator Tydings' conduct on the occasion mentioned, or at any other time.

"I wish further to say that I have known Millard Tydings all his life, and never knew of him being drunk, and never heard of such a thing, until I read the Davis letter, which I know to be untrue as far as it applies to me, and believe it to be untrue in its entirety.

"I have seen this letter, and it is a deliberate falsehood.

MRS. MAGRUDER SUCCEUMS TO APPENDICITIS.

Mrs. Bettie Rice Nalle Magruder, wife of C. C. Magruder, clerk of the Maryland Court of Appeals, and daughter of the late Dr. Richard Thomas Nalle, and Ellen Ann Hoop, of Culper, Va., died Monday night at the Woman's Hospital, Baltimore, at the age of 80 years.

August 19 last while summering at the Winchester Place, this city, Mrs. Magruder was stricken with appendicitis and was hurried to the Woman's Hospital, where an operation was performed. Despite her advanced age she rallied from the ordeal, and was on a fair way to recovery, when pulmonary complications developed and her heart failed. Besides her husband, Mrs. Magruder is survived by four sons, C. C. Magruder, Jr., Thomas M. Magruder, M. Hampton Magruder, and Arthur H. S. Magruder.

June 20, 1868 a double wedding was held in Washington when Mr. Magruder married Miss Bettie Rice Nalle and the latter's sister, Miss Mary D. Nalle, was married to the late John W. Belt, of Prince Georges county. Mrs. Belt now lives at the Belt estate near Rosaryville.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock from Holy Trinity Protestant Episcopal Church, Collington, Prince Georges county.

Crabbe is wholly unwarranted and circulated with the idea of securing my defeat and that in addition to the statements contained in the advertisement, I have entered suit against each of the persons circulating these letters and will prosecute said suits before a jury to prove to the people of Maryland the methods adopted by those connected with this affair and the falsity of the charges.

I appeal to the fair minded people of my district to show their contempt for such tactics, confident that I have thrown the true light on this charge, and that they will not countenance such degrading practices.
