50 YEARS A RECTOR RENOUNCES CHURCH

New York, Oct. 25.—The Rev. Samuel Davis McConnell, once rector of Holy Trinity Church, Brooklyn, and for half a century a widely known clergyman of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in a book published yesterday renounces the faith upon which Christian churches are founded, disbelieves as incredible the miracles recounted in the New Testament and denies the divinity of Christ. The jacket of the book bears the following: "I have been for 50 years a minister in the church I entered the ministry with enthusiasm, believing as I did that the church was the one organization in the world of divine institution, that it owes its origin to Jesus Christ and that He was the unique Son of God. I have been reluctantly led to the conclusion that none of these things are true." The church, Dr. McConnell believes, has in it much more of paganism than of the life of Christ, and asserts that many of the most of the ceremonies of the church are far older than Christ, some of them springing, he says, from the time of primitive man. The known facts of the life of

Jesus Christ, Dr. McConnell says in a chapter entitled "Jesus of the Gospels," would fill less than a column of newspaper space, and that far less is known of Him than of several other personages of the time. In summarizing the contents of his book, Dr. McConnell says: "The educated and practical world are both alike steadily drawing away from the church. I have watched this movement for 50 years. Can anything be done to reverse it? First of all, the church must open her eyes and look, but she must not look at things as they were in the Fourth Century, the Twelfth or the Eighteenth. She should no longer rest in a fool's paradise." Dr. McConnell's explanation of his book in brief. "So far I have been silent," he says. "I wanted to be sure before speaking. Fifty years is surely long enough for consideration. Now I openly avow my convictions and leave it to the church to do with me as it sees fit. But I confess I do so with the hope that after I have said all I have to say the church may decide that I, and such as I, have a place in its ministry." Dr. McConnell is now living in retirement near Easton, Md.

JACKSON IS ACCUSED OF PARTY TREASON

Former United States Senator William P. Jackson is charged, in a letter sent him by the Bruce Republican Club, with breach of party trust in forcing the renomination of United States Senator France; with debauching the party, and with releasing all Republicans from every claim to support which he or his "un-Republican" candidate may ever have possessed. The letter was approved Monday at a meeting of the executive committee of the club and signed by E. Ridgely Simpson, secretary, in behalf of the committee. Mr. Simpson said that since the last meeting of the committee a number of influential Republicans had joined the movement in the Republican party for the defeat of Senator France. These include George A. Pearce, Richard J. White, Mrs. Calvin F. Troupe, Frederick P. Roe, Charles E. C. Smith, David F. Orr, A. I. Caplan and Pierce Brawner. The letter to former Senator Jackson, in part, follows: "In the nomination of Dr. France we, as loyal Republicans, see what we believe to be a willful and intentional attempt to debase our party and employ it as an instrumentality in the destruction of the very government which it has nobly helped through generations to erect. "We refuse to consider Dr. France a Republican as we know and respect that term. The friend of America's enemies is no Republican; one who openly consorts with a communistic government, which avowedly seeks the overthrow of our most sacred institutions is no Republican; the man who repudiates the Republican party on the floor of the Senate is no Republican; the Senator who by a disgraceful abuse of his franking privilege turns public funds to private use is no Republican. "Republicanism to us means something very different. It stands for constructive, sane and loyal progress and of the party in the nation's service. With the Doctor, it is too often apt to be the nation in the Senator's service. His record of public non-accomplishment and private self-aggrandizement is the laughing stock of his colleagues in the Senate and the disgrace of his State. "You have debauched your party, violated your trust and released all true Republicans from every claim to support, which you or your un-Republican candidate may ever have possessed. "You have abandoned your party by seeking the overthrow of its principles and your party must, therefore, abandon your candidate for you."

PRAYED AFTER FIVE CROP FAILURES; NOW GIVE THANKS FOR RECORD YIELD

New England, N. D., Oct. 25.—In spite of a cold, drizzling rain lasting all day, the largest auditorium in this town was filled with people from all religious sects, who joined in a special community thanksgiving service in gratitude for the bountiful harvest. Catholics, Protestants, ministers and laymen of all local denominations came together and in prayer, hymns and sermon expressed gratitude to God for the big crops, which came after a similar meeting May 28 last. Both meetings were arranged by laymen. All local ministers took part and the community choir was selected from the four churches, Catholic, Congregational, Norwegian, Lutheran and German Lutheran. Following five years of drought and short crops, last May when the Red Cross, County and Federal Government had been appealed to for aid in planting crops, people were almost without hope and a call to prayer for a good crop was heeded by many. Plenty of rain and an ideal growing season followed, big crops were harvested. The Rev. William Gevers, German Lutheran minister, declared the prayers were heard. His Scripture reading was from Psalm 136, "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good; for His mercy endureth forever." The Rev. W. H. Ashley, Congregationalist, took his text from Psalm 133, "Bless the Lord, oh my soul, and forget not all His benefits. He said: "In setting apart a special day of thanksgiving, you are setting an example to the world. I believe the heavens were opened on May 28, and because of this act of God our hearts are filled with gratitude." Prayer was offered and benediction given by the Rev. Father Joseph Poettgens, Catholic priest. "If any person shall, with a view to evade the payment of taxes, fail or refuse to give in any bonds, notes, claims or other evidences of debt which are subject to assessment and taxation under this article, the same shall not be recoverable by action at law or suit in equity before any of the Courts of this State until they have been listed and the tax paid thereon, with an addition of fifty per centum per annum from the time the tax accrued; and the failure to give in said bonds, notes, claims or other evidences of debt shall be taken as prima facie evidence of the intention to so evade payment of taxes.
