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POULTRY SHOW A BIG SUCCESS

THE STATE ARMORY CROWDED WITH BIRDS OF FINE FEATHER AND HIGH EGG PRODUCING QUALITIES—EXHIBIT WILL NOT CLOSE UNTIL SATURDAY EVENING

Complete List of Awards in Exhibition Classes—Special Prizes—Cup Awards and Scores in Standard-Production Class to be Announced Next Week.

The Maryland Mid-State Show which has been running all this week at the State Armory will not close until Saturday night. Large crowds from this and other counties of the State have taken advantage of this exceptional display to poultry. The judging of the Standard-Production Class by Prof. Jones of Storrs, Conn. brought out a large number of persons interested in the determining the egg-producing qualities of the birds.

The Maryland State Poultry Association sold medals for the champion male in the exhibition classes was awarded to Light Brahma cock owned by Mr. George E. Walters, of Baltimore. The gold medal for the highest scoring female in the Standard production class went to the S. C. White Leghorn pullet of Robert E. Day, of Skylesville.

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LECTURE AT W. M. G.

HAMILTON HOLT TO LECTURE ON "FEDERATION OF THE WORLD."

The next event of general interest to take place at Western Maryland College will be Friday, November 24th at 8 p. m., in Alumni Hall. It is the lecture on the "Federation of the World" by Hamilton Holt, Executive Director of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation and former editor of The Independent. He has been decorated by the Emperor of Japan, the King of Greece, the King of Italy and the French Republic. In 1918 Mr. Holt visited all the battlefronts of the allied armies as the official guest of the various governments. When the covenant of the League of Nations was drafted Mr. Holt was in Paris and Colonel House appointed him liaison officer between the American delegation and the League to Enforce Peace. Later Mr. Holt toured the United States with Mr. Tatt and others, speaking in favor of the League. Mr. Holt visited England, France and Germany again in the summer of 1920 and since then has kept in close touch with the situation here and abroad. During the presidential campaign of 1920 Mr. Holt took a leading part as an advocate of American entrance into the League of Nations and has maintained this position ever since. The subject of his lecture will be the "Federation of the World" and will bring us the last word in regard to the peace movement. The lecture will be interesting on account of the man himself, the substance of his thought, and the way he delivers it. No admission fee and no ticket will be required to hear him, and it is hoped this opportunity to hear so great a speaker will be appreciated by the citizens of Carroll county.
