Iowa City, Ia., Nov. 13.—One thousand automobiles, which have been spectators to the Iowa-Massachusetts game Saturday were still stranded in mud in West Liberty, Cedar Rapids and Iowa City, and scores were stranded in barns, or left along roadsides here because rains which have made much of the highways are in forecast.

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
