JANUARY CLEARANCE SALE BEGINS SATURDAY, DECEMBER 30th

Our standard of merchandising requires that stocks be kept, at all times, clear of goods that for any reason have not sold at regular prices; merchandise, that because of style will not be in demand the coming season; goods that have been soiled and mussed from handling. To do this we lower the price to such a point that customers are benefited in buying.

So our January Clearance Sale is largely a collection of "Close-Outs", with enough regular merchandise of a domestic character, at special low prices, to give added interest. There is three months of cold weather ahead in which to use much of the merchandise offered in the Clearance Sale.

Before closing this introductory paragraph, we feel that we owe it to our customers and should frankly tell them, that higher rather than lower prices are to be expected on all staple cotton goods. Raw cotton at this date is selling at 27 cents a pound. One year ago the price of cotton was about 15 cents. We are not encouraging anyone to buy more goods than they need. We do believe now is a good time to buy all the goods you will need for several months ahead.
