Foreigners' Quarrel
Over Woman Sends Two Men to Hospital
Slivtvo Tovic, aged 33, is in the Harrisburg Hospital in a critical condition with a number of ugly stab wounds in his stomach, back and chest, and a probable penetration of one lung; and Jovo Stojadinov, 36 years of age, is in the same institution with cuts on the head, face and body, as a result of a stabbing affray in Myers street, Steelton, shortly before noon to-day.

Roda Tovic, said to be the man who started the cutting, was arrested soon after the fight by Constable James Haines. He was sent to jail without the benefit of a lawyer. The quarrel is said to have been over a woman. Stojadinov got into the fight as a peacemaker.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 20.—Investigation of the administration of Indian Affairs by the United States Department of the Interior, is demanded in a resolution introduced in the Senate by Senator Penrose.

The resolution recites the accomplishments of the expedition, and provides for the appointment of a commission of seven to consider and report to Congress the condition of obtaining among the Indians.

This committee, in conjunction with the Indian Commissioner and Dr. Joseph M. Dixon, leader of the Rodman Wanamaker expedition, are empowered by the resolution to prepare a bill to be submitted to Congress that shall furnish an equitable and comprehensive system of administration for all Indians on the reservations or on the public lands.

Senator Penrose said Mr. Wanamaker's expedition among the Indians had accomplished a great work. Dr. Dixon's book, he said, furnished complete information regarding the present condition of the American Indians.
