The nineteenth annual convention of the directors' department of the Pennsylvania State Educational Association will open Thursday and last for two days. School directors from all over the State will be here.

Dr. William N. Yates, a member of the City School Board, will conduct the devotional exercises and D. D. Hammelbaugh, secretary of the Harrisburg board, will make the address of welcome.

S. R. McClure, of Pittsburgh, will make the response. Harry A. Boyer, president of the Harrisburg School Board, will tell of the Fourth International Congress of School Hygiene. The report of the legislative committee will conclude the morning session. J. C. Brown, president of the department, will talk in the afternoon and three State officials are on the program. These are Dr. Nathan C. Schaeffer, Superintendent of Public Instruction; Dr. Samuel G. Dixon, Commissioner of Health, and Dr. John Price Jackson, Commissioner of Labor and Industry.

The program for Thursday evening includes addresses by M. G. Brumbaugh, superintendent of schools of Philadelphia, and Henry Honck, Secretary of Internal Affairs.

At the final meeting at Central high school Friday morning Dr. Samuel Hamilton, of Allegheny county, will talk to the students; Dr. F. B. Downes will tell of the progress of the fight for recognition of teachers' training schools and Andrew Smith, of Allegheny county, will give a "plain talk."
