WILL FOUND IN DRESS HEM IS CONTESTED

Relatives Who Were Left Out Don't Believe Mrs. Durkees Put It There

The question of whether or not Margaret Durkees really wrote the will and codicil found in the hem of her black silk dress and behind the final photograph in the family album, was put up to President Judge Kunkel and a Dauphin county Common Pleas jury today.

This problem is the cause of the suit brought by Minnie S. Moore against Sarah Karchner, Emma Collier and Harriet Bigler Hamilton, relatives of Mrs. Durkees, who died a few years ago. Minnie is named as the beneficiary of Mrs. Durkees' estate by the will and codicil and the defendants don't believe the dead woman wrote the so-called "wills" at all.

Death of Conrad L. Hale at New Cumberland Home

New Cumberland, Pa., Feb. 26.—Conrad L. Hale, a well-known retired business man, died at his home in Bridge street about 5 o'clock this morning after an illness of several years. He says they were not severe but appeared to be not far distant.


