

## STEVENS CHURCH MEN TO HOLD BANQUET

Three hundred men will attend the first annual banquet of the newly organized Men's Club of Stevens Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, to be held in Stevens Church Monday night, March 16.

This is the first of the numerous activities planned for the club. Meetings are being held once a week, on Monday nights, and once a month the Sunday evening sermon will be preached by the Rev. Dr. Clayton Albert Smucker on the interests of the men of the church. A social evening of some sort will be held once a month.
