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POPE CELEBRATES HIS NAME DAY IN VATICAN

Fatiguing Day's Work For Pontiff Followed Early Mass and Breakfast

 Rome, March 19.—"This is a salute for my name day," exclaimed Pope Plus when he was awakened early to-day by a terrific storm accompanied by vivid flashes of lightning and loud peals of thunder.
 His holiness shortly afterward celebrated mass in the presence of specially invited guests, including his sister and a niece. After the mass his two sisters, who reside in Rome, and his niece, Signorina Farolli, daughter of another sister, were received by the pope in his private apartments, where they stayed to breakfast.
 The audiences then began and a fatiguing day's work was continued, although every function was cut to as brief a period as possible.

U. S. Steel Profits Increase \$26,976,936

 New York, March 19.—The annual report of the United States Steel Corporation for the year ended December 31, 1913, shows earnings available for dividends on the common and preferred stocks amounting to \$81,216,985, an increase of 26,976,936 over the previous year.
 After dividends and the deduction of \$15,000,000 used for additional property and construction and capital obligations, a surplus for the year amounting to \$15,532,183 was added to profit and loss account. There was an increase of \$11,976,936 over the previous year, in which there was no special deduction from earnings.
 The total surplus of the company was \$151,798,428, at the end of the year.



TOLLS CONTROVERSY RENEWED IN SENATE

Wilson May Be Asked For Names of All Protesting Foreign Nations

C., March 19.—Discussion of the Panama Canal tolls controversy was renewed in the Senate to-day when Senator Jones, of Washington, again urged the passage of his resolution asking President Wilson to submit to the Senate the names of all foreign governments which have protested against the tolls exemption provision of the canal act, together with copies of all communications that have passed between them and the United States on the subject. Senator Jones contended it was imperative that the Senate, before it understood to act upon President Wilson's request, should be informed as to the interests of the foreign nations in the matter. He pointed out that he resolution only requested information which the President deemed advisable to give.

Company to Spend \$150,000 During Year For Improvements and New Equipment

President Frank B. Musser's recommendations for important improvements and betterments were approved to-day by the directors of the Harrisburg Railways Company. These improvements involve an expenditure of at least \$150,000 and mean changes for the better in the service of the company.
