FIRE DESTROYS SIX HOUSES AT BURNHAM

Lewistown Department Sent to Assistance; Fire Trucks Collide, Injuring Several

Special to The Telegraph Lewistown, Pa., March 26.—A fire that broke out in the residence of William Edward at Burnham spread until it destroyed six houses. The Lewistown fire department was called on and rendered assistance. The Brooklyn fire truck of this place collided with the Burnham truck at the scene of the fire. Harry Walters, of Burnham, was injured about the body. William Edward, an aged man who was in the bathroom of his home, was overcome with smoke. The men of the night crew of Burnham rushed into the house and saved him from the flames. The loss is \$8,000. Several bystanders received bruises when the trucks collided. The Brooklyn driver was blinded by the light, which caused the run-in.
