London Paper Says Carranza and Villa Outmaneuvered U. S.

The London Times of March 6 says: "The abandonment by the Anglo-American commission at El Paso of all hope of seeing Mr. Benton's body and of conducting a satisfactory investigation into the Mexican soil into his death and the death of Mr. Bauch is interpreted by most newspapers to imply the failure of Washington to secure anything like an adequate investigation into the fate of Messrs. Benton and Bauch or the recovery of Mr. Benton's body. Impartial opinion is instinctively inclined to take the same view."

"It is felt that, either jointly or independently, General Villa and Carranza have out-manuevered Washington. First General Villa wasted valuable days in procrastinating about Mr. Benton's body. Then, presumably after assuring himself that the United States had no intention of using force, General Carranza vetoed General Villa's tardy concession. General Carranza is now reported to be on his way to visit General Villa at Juarez. He is said to be accompanied by 2,000 men, but whether he and General Villa quarrel or embrace the result is likely to be unsatisfactory."

"Either the United States will be more or less openly defied, or the Constitutionalists will come to terms about the investigation after arranging for the absence of damaging testimony. In either case Washington is likely to remain passive."

"Mr. Bryan is stated to have expressed himself yesterday before the House committee on foreign relations optimistically, if vaguely, about an automatic solution of the Mexican mud-puddle. He repeats the stock opinion that President Huerta was losing ground and that the revolutionaries are gaining ground."
