New Records Made by All-American Stars

San Francisco, Pa., April 1.—With four Australian and seventeen State records to their credit, the four athletes composing the All-American track team arrived here yesterday ready to compete again in ten days.

Among the records brought from the Antipodes was one in the mile run made by James A. Powers, of the Boston Athletic Association, the day before the team left for America.

George Parker, of the Stockton, Cal., high school, broke the Australasian shot put record eleven times during the thirteen weeks, his best mark standing 45 feet 3/4 inch.

Pinehurst, N. C., April 1.—A margin of a single stroke and a card of 157 won yesterday qualification gold medal for young Philmore K. Robeson, of the Pawling school, over Walter J. Travis, of Garden City, who recorded 158.

R. S. Worthington, of Shawnee, made 78-82 for 160 and second place in the championship bracket, owing to the fact that Robeson withdrew from match play.

Chisholm Beach, of Fox Hills, with 77-84, and Paul E. Gardner, of Onondaga, with 79-83, were next in line in 181 and 182. C. L. Becker, of Woodland; Robert Hunter, of Weeburn, and Harold Weber, of Toledo, tied at 163 with a quadruple tie of 168; M. P. O'Connell, of Alpine, being the last man to make the first division, with a total of 169.

The low card of the day was a 78, for Weber and Barnes, Doctor Gardner and R. W. Harvey, each making 79.

New York, April 1.—The complete list of members of the American Olympic committee, which will undertake the responsibility for the adequate representation of the United States in the Olympic games at Berlin in 1916, was announced to-day by James E. Sullivan, the committee's secretary.

Colonel Robert M. Thompson, of Washington, is chairman of the executive committee, and Julian W. Curtiss, of Yale University, is chairman of the finance committee, whose members will be designated shortly by Mr. Curtiss.

The selection of the team will rest with a special committee of fifty-four members, under the chairmanship of James E. Sullivan, among the members of this important committee are Charles F. Adams, 2d, Boston; Dr. Frank Angell, Leland Stanford; Julian W. Curtiss and Dr. Luther H. Gulick; E. K. Hall, Boston; A. A. Stagg, Chicago, and H. A. Williams, Minnesota.

\$25,000 Rug Given the Sayres by Ambassador

New York, April 1.—A \$25,000 Oriental rug, which should have been received last November, to-day reached the importers who arranged its transportation.

The rug is 9 feet by 5 feet 3 inches. The center design is a medallion 3 1/2 feet long, bearing the Turkish yodrak on a dark blue background, representing the sky, and the 16-inch border consists of flowering birds and flowers, which are Turkish symbols for conjugal happiness.

The importer said the rug is more than 200 years old, must have come from the sultan's looms and have taken six years to complete.

Mayor of Gallatin Held as Bank Thief

Nashville, Tenn., April 1.—Will B. Brown, mayor of Gallatin, arrested last night for embezzling \$30,000 from the First National Bank of Gallatin, was released to-day under \$15,000 bail for examination April 14.

Herbert B. Jackson, employe of the State mining department, charged with aiding and abetting Brown, is under a \$5,000 bond.

Fire was discovered in the bank vault March 29 and it was reported robbers had blown the safe. Bank officials say the shortage will reach \$60,000.
